Council Orders Test of Pressure on All Hydrants.

Do Not Come Up to Requirements of the Contract.

At the meeting of the city council last night Councilman Wallace introduced the following two resolutions, which were

adopted without dissent;
Resolved, That the chairman of the fire and light committee be, and is hereby, directed to cause to be inspected all water hydrants now maintained by the Council Bluris City Water Works company, and to file a written report with the city cierk specifying the utility thereof, taking into consideration the location of each and the requirement for adequate service as specified by the franchise under which the system of water works was constructed; and, further, be it

Resolved, That the acting city solicitors be requested to prepare a suitable notice Resolved. That the acting city solicitors be requested to prepare a suitable notice to be served upon the Council Bluffs City Water Works company, notifying said company that from the date of said notice the city will decline payment of any rental charge from any hydrant from which inadequate supply or pressure of water is maintained for fire protection, taking into consideration the location of such hydrant. Resolved, By the city council of the city of Council Bluffs, that from the date of the passage of this resolution that no payment shall be made or allowed on account of any claims or bills presented by the Council Bluffs City Water Works company on account of rental charge for any hydrant where the water supply or pressure furnished is less than that required by section by of the original franchise granted to said company.

Meaning of Resolution.

## Menning of Resolution.

That is to say that no rental shall be paid for any hydrant located upon any mains where said company is unable to discharge or throw at least six streams of water simultaneously out of a one-inch nozzle to a height of 100 feet in any part of the main business portion of the city and at least two such streams to a height of fifty feet at any point on the line of its mains.

When the resolutions were presented by Mr. Wallace some of the councilmen thought they ought to be referred to the acting city solicitors, Messra, Harl & Tinley, but made no objection to adopting them when informed by the councilman from the Third ward that they had been drawn by that firm of attorneys.

"Do I understand it that in the event of any hydrant falling to meet the requirements specified in the resolution, it is to be removed," asked Manager Hart of the water works company, who was present. "I presume so," replied Mr. Wallace, and this is as far as the discussion went.

Among the bills before the council was one from the water works company for \$4,220 "to equal \$60 per annum on 288 fire hydrants from March 1, 1906, to March 1, 1907." The amount, it is understood, is the difference between the hydrant rentals called for in a previous rate ordinance and one recently passed by the council.
