GREELY ON ARMY AFFAIRS

Division Commander Favors Canteen and Larger Pay.

RECRUITS OF LOW STANDARD

He Also Advocates a Bigger Army, Greater Variety of Food and Heavier Penalty for Desertion.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—The annual report of Major General A. W. Greely, commanding the north division of the army, which includes the Departments of the Army, Lakes, Districts and Missouri, says that the main reason for desertion, according to the universal opinion of a large number of commissioned and non-commissioned officers, was the small pay, seconded by the lack of the canteen and resultant trouble in dives surrounding the army posts, and the low standard and general worthless character of the recruits is characterized as a corollary of the small pay given men.

General Greely urges increase of pay of officers and men, a five-year term of enlistment, a material increase in strength of the infantry and restoration of the canteen to the extent of safety base, or, if the canteen is not restored, that there should be legislation similarly restricting the use of liquor by all federal officials and employees.

Canteen Decreases Drunkenness.

He says it is beyond reasonable doubt that the establishment of the canteen decreases drunkenness and that its elimination has largely increased idleness, drinking and dissipation among enlisted men.

General Greely recommends the pay of less than a year's service be increased from 20 to 50 per cent, and that minimum penalty for desertion should never be less than the unexpired term of enlistment. General Greely urges the necessity of materially increasing the pay of officers and declares that unless it is contemplated that the army shall be officered from an aristocracy of wealth, for an officer's position is fast becoming impossible for a man without private income, increased pay should be given him.

More Infantry Needed.

General Greely says the minimum infantry strength should be increased to fifteen regiments, but if duty in Cuba and on the isthmus is to be part of the army work it should be twenty regiments. Discussing camps of instruction and post schools he expresses his opinion that there is a tendency of overeducation by books and lectures, both as regards officers and enlisted men.

General Greely holds that the army rank, while excellent in quality and doubtless of sufficient nutritive value, in quantity and variety does not satisfy the American soldier.

When supplemented, through supplies from gardens, pot exchange profits, etc., it furnishes only a meager, monotonous diet. He suggests that various edibles found on every American table, even of the poorest people, are entirely lacking in the army ration, although they appear on the naval list.

BRULE LANDS OF GOOD QUALITY

Said to Be Fully Up to the Standard of Those in the Rosebud.

PIERRE, S. D., Aug. 21.—(Special Telegram)—Senator Charles Burke, who introduced the bill which places the Lower Brule lands in the market, which are to be opened in October, has returned from a trip over the lands, in which he was accompanied by Register Whelan of the land office and John L. Nowell. They report that there is a tendency of the lower Brule claims along the river, to be as good a quality as the Rosebud lands and no Indians holding allotments upon it.

BLACK HILLS CONFERENCE CLOSES

Effort to Be Made to Redeem Old College Buildings.

HOT SPRINGS, S. D., Aug. 21.—(Special Telegram)—The twenty-eighth annual conference of the Black Hills mission closed this morning. The education committee submitted its report in regard to the location of an academy in the Black Hills, which was unanimously adopted. They said they believed the time had come to open an academy in the Black Hills in affiliation with the Dakota Wesleyan university at Mitchell in accordance with the plan previously agreed upon, approved by the board of directors of the university. The committee believed it best to try to redempt the property of the old Black Hills college here. It can be bought for \$13,000, and Hot Springs has raised its bonus to \$7,000.

San Albans, Spain, Aug. 21.—Count de Albeniz Salazar, the foreign minister, has announced that Great Britain, France, Germany and Spain have instructed their respective consuls at Fez to leave, together with their countrymen, when they judge the situation to be dangerous.

SECOND ATTACK BY ARABS

Another Assault on French Camp at Casablanca Results in Defeat of Natives.

CASABLANCA, Aug. 21.—The Arabs have delivered another attack upon the French force, under General Druce, encamped outside the town, but they were routed, with very heavy losses.

A general uprising of the natives is expected. The European residents of the coast towns, as well as those who live at Fez, Morocco City and other places in the interior, are leaving their homes and seeking safety in flight.

The loss of the Moors in yesterday's attack upon the city is estimated by Jewish courtiers at over 2,000 killed.

PARIS, Aug. 21.—In a telegram dated Monday, Vice Admiral Philibert Repaert-Intermittent artillery firing at Casablanca, both from the land and the sea, to quiet the tribesmen back of the town. Quiet prevails at the other Moroccan ports.

AUTO ACCIDENT IN FRANCE

American Runs Down Peddler and Kills Him and is Himself Badly Hurt.

LOUVIERS, France, Aug. 21.—While Joseph Frits, an American, was driving his powerful automobile near here today he ran down and killed a peddler. The machine swerved and was wrecked. Mr. Frits was thrown out and sustained a fractured skull. He was removed to a hospital, where his condition is said to be critical.

WORK FOR THE HAGUE COURT

Great Britain Accepts United States Offer to Arbitrate Fisheries Dispute.

LONDON, Aug. 21.—Great Britain has accepted the proposition of the United States to submit the Newfoundland fisheries dispute to arbitration at the Hague. While the matter is in process of arbitration the fisheries will be conducted under the same modus vivendi as last year.

Abductor Found Dead.

EVANSTON, Wyo., Aug. 21.—(Special Telegram)—The remains of the man found near Smoot some time ago have been identified as those of Alexander White, the Jackson Hole abductor of the peace who absconded last fall with about \$500 of the funds of the county. White had evidently attempted to reach the railroad on foot, and overtaken by a storm, perished in the open.
