

ORDEAL OF THE IMMIGRANT

Scenes Along the Gangway at Ellis Island.

TRIPLE MEDICAL EXAMINATION

Before the Special Inquiry Board—In the Hospital—Task of the Women Inspectors—The Detained.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—A ferryboat has reached Ellis Island with the immigrants from a great steamship. With battered boxes and portly bundles its occupants begin to struggle up the gangway that leads to the central examination room.

Inside there is stir and bustle. The doctors, nurses, inspectors spring to their feet, ready and alert, as the immigrants file in. Each immigrant has pinned to his clothing a ticket corresponding to the number of the cage or pen in which he is to wait for examination.

The Cerberus that guards the gateways of America has three heads, one at each corner of the triangle around which the immigrant passes on his way to the customs inspector. The doctor at the first notes the apparent physical condition of those who pass him.

While the immigrant stands still the doctor wields his fingers, stretches them out and deftly turns back the eyelids in search of that bar to admission—trachoma. Any evidence of this disease leaves no option under the law but to ship the immigrant back again.

As They Come Along. Behind the large central hall is a small apartment set aside for those who have been detained for further examination.

Presently a woman comes along, of decent appearance, evidently from some English country town. She has passed the first two doctors and is in line for the third. He looks at her, examines her eyelids, wipes his fingers and just as she is about to pass along seizes a piece of chalk and marks "vision" in great staring letters down the front of her dress.

Let me go, she cries. My sister is waiting for me. There is no time for explanation; she is holding up the line. She bursts into tears and is half dragged, half carried away.

Have you seen my father? he inquires. An old man inside the pen halls him, waves his arms and bursts into song. The woman stops weeping and stares at him in terror.

Woman Inspector at Work. A comely girl steps along the aisle. She has passed the physicians. Her eyes have been examined and found to be free from trachoma. Her general health appears superb.
