RULES OF POSTAL CONGRESS

Regulations for Mail Between This and Other Countries.

MOST RATES REMAIN AS NOW

Schedules Go Into Effect First of October and Are Published Now for the First Time.

The Postoffice department has just issued voluminous instructions governing the international postoffice rules adopted by the Universal Postal congress held at Rome in May, 1906, and to which the late Edward Rosewell was a delegate. The rules become effective October 1 and will govern the exchange of mails between the United States and countries represented in the Postal union, except Canada, Mexico, Cuba and the Republic of Panama. The postage rates remain unchanged, except the rate applicable to letters and are: For letters, 5 cents for the first ounce and 3 cents for each additional ounce or fraction; prepayment is optional. For postal cards, single, 3 cents, and double, 4 cents each. For commercial papers, 5 cents for

OMAHA JOBBERS BENEFITED

Get Even Shake with North on Northwestern's New Line.

PLEASANT SURPRISE TO THEM

Schedule of Freight Rates Shows Omaha is Treated Favorably with Reference to Black Hills Business.

Local jobbers are elated over the new tariff which has been prepared for the Black Hills country by the Chicago & Northwestern railroad. When the Northwestern announced it would hold from Pierre to Rapid City, S. D., it was thought the building of that line would have a tendency to put the entire Black Hills territory into the hands of the jobbers of Sioux City, St. Paul and Minneapolis. That it has not done so is shown by the tariff just published by the Northwestern, effective October 1, which shows the same reductions are made on all classes between Omaha and Lead and between St. Paul and Minneapolis and Lead.

American Pay Calls.
BERLIN, Aug. 30.—The American army officers, headed by Brigadier General W. S. Ederly, who are to attend the general maneuvers as guests of Emperor William, today paid official calls, accompanied by the American military attaché, Colonel Wissner, and Major Von Koerner, the German military attaché at Washington. Their entertainment in Germany will begin with a reception in their honor to be given this afternoon by Colonel and Mrs. Wissner.

EVERY SORT OF ARMY FEAT

Gamut of Military Tests Will Be Run at the St. Joseph Tournament.

The program of the regular army military tournament to be held at St. Joseph for three days following September 24, includes almost every test of sports and skill to which a soldier might be subjected. There are twenty kinds of events for infantry, cavalry and artillery branches of the service, and \$4,000 will be given in prize money. Beside the usual competitive manual drills there will be contests in target pitching and light armkicking. Equipment races in which men will vie with each other in donning their traveling kits and fighting gear will be held, and in one event cavalry men will race and pick up their revolvers, handkerchiefs and other small articles from the ground as they are going. Spectacular amusement will be furnished by wall scaling contests and old Roman hurdle races, in which men will double mount standing and make their ride two horses' leap hurdles. The hospital corps will exhibit their skill in giving first aid to the injured. They will pick up patients from the field and from a diagnosis pinned to a tag on each patient's clothing will bind and bandage and convey to the ambulance as in real battle fields.
