

OMAHA WINS DOUBLE-HEADER

Takes Two from Sioux and Lincoln Beats Des Moines.

SIX THOUSAND AT VINTON PARK

Great Crowd Sees Two Splendid Games—Thompson, Bressler and Sanders Pitch Effective Ball.

Baseball for the hour. The Omaha family are rejoicing over a double victory at Vinton street park yesterday afternoon while Des Moines was losing a game to Lincoln. The first game was captured by faster all-around work on the bases and opportune hitting; the second was taken because Gus Thompson refused to allow the Sioux to hit one while the Omaha folks were making eight off Mr. Corbett. This all helps in the grand chase which is now on for the pennant in the Western league.

No cooler spot could be found in Omaha Sunday than Vinton street park where over 5,000 fans gathered to watch the Bourke battle for the championship. They were rewarded with two mighty fast games of base ball, for both teams to their mettle and put up a splendid article of the national game. Bressler and Sanders, the two southpaws, were pitted against each other in the opening contest and although Sanders was hit the harder of the two the Bourke was faster on bases and made more of their few hits. In the second game it was Gus Thompson against Corbett and Gue carried off the honors, passing but one and allowing but one hit.

King Opens with a Pass. In the opener Ethelbert King drew a pass which he cashed in on Frank's double and a fielder's choice on Dolan's punt to the pitcher. That was the first run. The next two were made by a clever exhibition of the bunting game. With one out Graham made a clean single and Autrey's safe punt hit him on second. Graham and Autrey pulled off a double steal before the Sioux knew what was going on. Goding was not to be outdone by the kids of the family, so he made a clean hit, scoring Graham and putting Autrey on third. Goding attempted to take second and Colonel Weed fumbled the ball until Autrey had scored. That made three for Omaha.

War Sanders was given quite a lambasting in the sixth inning, four clean hits being made for a total of two runs but he settled after that and the game finished as it was. Campbell opened the inning with a triple to the fence and Nance followed with a single which sent Campbell home. Nance went to second on Nobili's single and came home from second on a single by Slattery which went into Slattery's garden. Which threw wild to the plate or the run would have been double off.

Second Game Short and Sweet. The second game was short and sweet, but an hour and ten minutes being consumed in playing the seven innings. Omaha made four runs in the first three innings and it was soon that the game was made as Thompson refused to let up. In the first round King and Franck singled and Autrey booted them along with a sacrifice. A passed ball, credited to Sheehan let King come home from third and Franck kept coming also and was safe at the plate because Mr. Corbett fumbled the ball when Sheehan shot it at him.

The second run was a simple affair. Austin made a two-sacker and LeBrand scored him with a single. King opened the third inning with a single, just as he had the first round. He stole second and Franck sacrificed him to third. He scored and he was placed home by Charles Adams. He was all the run Omaha made in the second game but it was enough, for Sioux City made but one.

The lone run captured by the Sioux in the second game was caused by a two base punt on the part of Thompson, which was followed by the Omaha pitcher, Sheehan hit an easy one to Gus who threw out Dolan's reach and Sheehan took second because of ground rules, made because the overflow crowd was scattered over the field. Williams followed with a double which he pulled out of Autrey's reach and Sheehan came home.
