LABOR TURNS OUT IN FORCE
Six Thousand Workmen in the Line of March at Des Moines.
GIRLS CELEBRATE BY STRIKE
Among the Features of the Parade Was a Printer Ninety Years of Age and a Telegraph Operator Eighty-Three.
(From a Staff Correspondent.)
DES MOINES, Ia., Sept. 3.—(Special.)—Nearly 6,000 workmen were in the Labor day parade in this city today. It was the largest and most successful parade the labor organization has ever had here. Conspicuous in the parade were the striking telegraph operators with big banners bearing the one word, "Stick." Certain stores in the city refused to close for the day and the parade was so arranged to escape passing those stores. Later in the day the girl clerks at the 5 and 10 cent store all struck and sent emissaries to the other stores and in a short time the streets were filled with striking girl clerks, the strike taking place soon after the noon hour.

The line of march was made up of four divisions, each led by a band. In the parade was James Irwin, a member of the Typographical union, who is over 90 years old. He rode in a carriage provided by the union. T. J. Schnell, aged 83 years, a member of the Telegraph Operators' union, was also in the parade. Four more unions were in the parade this year than last and the total number in the parade was considerably more than last year.

Traveler Turned on Gas.
W. J. Fawcett, commercial salesman of Fort Dodge, turned on the gas at the Stagg hotel in this city and lay down on the bed to die, but will live and recover. He had no baggage and only \$2 in money. Smell of gas in the hallway led to the discovery.

New Temple Dedicated.
The synagogue of Tifereth Israel was dedicated Sunday and among the speakers was Governor Cummins. Before the dedicatory service the privileges of opening the doors and of lighting the perpetual fire and hanging the curtain before the ark were given to the highest bidder. The dedicatory address was delivered by Rabbi Farber.

Wanted in Kansas.
C. H. Crabtree was arrested here today on a charge of forgery committed in Kansas. Requisition papers will be asked for his transfer to that state. The arrest was made by Sheriff W. C. Miller of some land, the deed purporting to come from one Douglas, when it is claimed there is no Douglas and no land such as described in the deed.

For Alleged Waifs' Home.
George H. Davies has been arrested and sent for one year to the penitentiary from the police station on a charge of collecting money for an alleged waifs' home in that city. He told the police he had many accomplices working in many cities of the country.

Complain of New Law.
Complaint that the new law restricting the operation of baby farms is making people prevent the illegals from running a being made to the police. The law makes the inspection of the farms the duty of the State Board of Health and the state board inspectors only those which are licensed. It does not have any police powers to search out those that operate without paying a license. It is claimed that the new law will make an effort to get them closed up.

Organize Producers Club.
A producers' club is to be organized in Des Moines with the main object to get a bigger exhibit of Des Moines market at the fair. The club was organized twelve years ago, but fell by the wayside. It will be revived by the Des Moines Commercial club and some effort made to make a collective exhibit from Des Moines next year at the state fair.

Wesleyan Man Selected.
Paul Sisson, last year's quarterback in the Ohio Wesleyan football team, has been selected as the coach of the Des Moines High school football team. Sisson was a member of the Norfolk, Neb. team for four years and won the position in 1905. He is a native of Des Moines and retained it, being the lightest weight quarterback in the high schools of the state during the time. Ohio Wesleyan occupied a big place in football last year.

Many Murder Trials.
Iowa is to have many murder trials when the courts open this month. Tomorrow at Eldora there will begin the murder trial of E. E. Blydenburg, charged with the murder of his wife. He was tried and sentenced to be hanged and later given life imprisonment, and now is to have a new trial. This term of court at Des Moines will be held the Dickinson-Gadd murder trial, for the murder of Irene Blydenburg, daughter of the man tried in Eldora. The trial of Mrs. West for infanticide and of Cavertina Johnson of the Eleventh United States cavalry for the murder of a companion and of Otavia Laprovitera for the murder of a fellow Italian. At Marshalltown the trial of Bert Pell for the murder of John Lapeley and at Iowa City the trial of Elmer Pratt for the murder of W. F. Connell are to be held.

Start an Iowa Colony.
An Iowa colony is to be started in south Texas, at Lyford, a short distance north of the Rio Grande. Des Moines and C. H. Stevenson of this city have bought the entire townsite of Lyford which has not already been sold. The townsite comprises 60 acres and about 300 remain unsold. It is proposed to sink an artesian well producing 600 gallons per minute, construct a big reservoir for irrigation purposes and sell off the five and ten-acre tracts into which the townsite is laid to Iowa people for truck and fruit farms. A large number of Iowa people have already located on the farming land near the city. A school, hotel, depot, church, two general stores, hardware store and a lumber yard, fifteen or twenty residences and a population of 100 people constitute the town, all of which has been built since January 1 last.
