

MOORS LOSE CONTROL

Government Says it is Unable to Guarantee Safety of Foreigners.

FRANCE AND SPAIN MUST ACT

Powers Present at Algiers Agree as to Proper Course.

OCCUPATION TO BE TEMPORARY

No End of Foreign Control, However, is in Sight.

SOLDIERS MAY KEEP ORDER

Presence of Foreign Troops Likely to Inhibit Hostile Natives Until Extension of Scope May Be Necessary.

PARIS, Sept. 6.—A most important change, the Associated Press is informed, has occurred in the political aspect of the Moroccan question, a change which may have a far-reaching effect on the future of Morocco and the relations of the powers thereto.

France and Spain have the intention to occupy the littoral parts of Morocco with their own forces and establish police organizations. This contemplated action...

Although it is distinctly stipulated that this occupation is merely provisional, or until it is safe to recruit the police force from among the Moors, there is a strong feeling that the absolute anarchy reigning in Morocco means that this occupation of the ports may be long drawn out, perhaps lasting indefinitely.

Arrangements for the policing of these ports are now being made. The occupation of the ports may cause serious complications, resulting from the continued hostility of the fanatical Moors, a hostility which may compel an enlargement of the police action and culminate in a virtual military control of the Moroccan empire.

France has planned to occupy Mazagan, Mogador, Safi and Rabat, and Spain is to occupy El Arach and Tetuan. France and Spain together will occupy Casablanca and Tangier.

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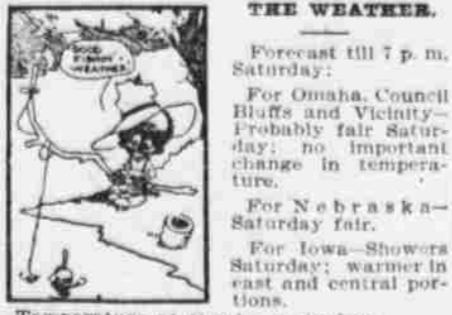
Advices from Fez under date of September 3, say it was then believed that Sultan Abdel Aza intended to leave for Rabat, probably September 7.

NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—Frank A.
