NEWS OF THE ARMY CIRCLE

Eighth Cavalry Completes Practice March from Fort Robinson to Minitaire.

The Eighth United States cavalry has just completed a practice march from Fort Robinson to Minitaire, Neb., on the North Platte and has returned to Fort Robinson.

The following general court-martial sentences have been promulgated at the Omaha postoffice: Private Matthew Williams, Company A, Twenty-first infantry, for desertion, two years' imprisonment; Jack B. Mitchell, Troop L, Second cavalry, for absence without leave, three months' imprisonment; Ralph M. Curdy, recruit coast artillery, for fraudulent enlistment, three months' imprisonment; Ingwald Loberg, Troop L, Second cavalry, for desertion, two and a half years' imprisonment; Harry C. Casey, Fifteenth company general service, for conduct unbecomingly and insubordination, six months' imprisonment; George J. Ripelle, Twenty-first battery field artillery, for desertion, one year's imprisonment; August Buchholz, Troop E, Sixth cavalry, for desertion, nine months' imprisonment with the sentence of dishonorable discharge from the army, and all of the longer sentences of imprisonment will be carried out at the Fort Leavenworth military prison.

Private C. B. Stokes, Company E, Eighth infantry, Fort Leavenworth, has been detailed on special duty as clerk at headquarters Department of the Missouri.
