The board decided it had no alternative but

STRICT RULES AT AMES COLLEGE

President Storms in Speech Discourses on Morals.

AMES, Ia., Sept. 13.-(Special.)-President B. Storms of Iowa State college gave an address in chapel Tuesday morning in which he laid great emphasis upon the morals of college life. The three particular topics that came in for discussion were, drinking, hazing and smoking These three he laid such deep stress upon and made such plain statements concern ing them that it is impossible for the students and others to misinterpret his meaning. Drinking, absolutely will not be tolerated, he states. Intexication shall be considered sufficient offense for exclusio from school and even drinking may bring on expulsion though the imbiber does not come intoxicated. This condition does not simply apply to drinking on or about the campus, President Storms was careful make plain, but any student who is found drinking or in an intoxicated condition at any place during the term of his relation to the college as a student will be

Hazing will not be permitted and studenis will be expelled when found in the usiness. It will be left to the authorities to judge as to what constitutes hazing when specific instances come up, stated the president in his address, believing that t was hardly necessary to explain what

hazing is. An often repeated and erstwhile rather ineffective rule was repeated in the statement that students will not be permitted to smoke upon the campus. This rule has been a standing rule for several years, but has been frequently, if not more often, disobeyed by members of the faculty and of the board of trustees.
