TUBERCULOSIS

State Board of Health Proposes to Wage War on Afflicted Cows.

DAIRYMEN CONCEAL THE FACTS

Atlantic Man is Making Attempt to Organise the Farmers for the Purpose of Controlling the Price of What They Produce.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, Sept. 17.—(Special.)— Some radical means will be sought by the State Board of Health to get quick action to kill off the tuberculosis afflicted cattle of Iowa and thus stamp out the disease. Secretary Thomas of the state board, since the publication of the report of a committee of the board on the dangerous proportions the disease is assuming in this state, believes that one of the worst conditions aiding in the spread of the disease is the fact that dairymen generally try to keep the fact secret if they have cattle afflicted and try to continue to sell milk from them. Rather than lose a cow they continue to sell milk, spreading the disease to many households. The department has no money with which to pay the owners for those cattle and claims anyway that the loss should

go to the owner of the cow and that owners should insist on their being inspected before they are purchased. Secretary Thomas claims that by far the greater part of the tuberculosis afflicting lows is due to the contagion from cow's milk and the disease in cattle spreads because of the lax methods of dairymen. Guard Companies in Parade.

Two companies of the Iowa National Guard, probably Burlington and Davenport, will participate in the parade in honor of President Roosevell at Keokuk next month. It is furthermore proposed to escort the president down the stream to Quincy with suitable escort of launches and small steamers. Major Meigs of Keokuk, who has charge of the river parade, has the promise of sixty boat owners that they will engage in the parade down the stream with the government boat bearing the president.

Hottest at Creston. Creston was the hottest town in Iowa esterday. The thermometer there registered 97. The temperature in Des Moines continued hot today, but the best was only 6 during the middle of the afternoon. New Officers' Quarters.
