SAFETY AT SOUTH OMAHA

Packers Not Worried Over Move of the Food Commissioner.

DIFFERENCES EASILY ADJUSTED

Dr. C. M. Schindler to Be President of the Newly Organized Live Stock National Bank and M. L. Lord Cashier.

The South Omaha packers have found no cause for alarm in the dispatch from Lincoln yesterday morning to the effect that the pure food commissioner, Johnson, was to begin a campaign of reform by prosecuting the packing houses which have offended against the recent pure food law. The law requires that packages of meat shall have the net weight stamped upon them.

Mr. Culver of the Omaha Packing company said: "Most of our packages have always been marked with the weight, as required by the law, lately in effect. The only knowledge of the intention of the pure food commissioner is that contained in the dispatch you refer to. We anticipate no trouble and are not alarmed."

Mr. Edwards of Swift and Company said: "The action of the pure food commissioner has not come up to us yet. The ostensible object of the law is to prevent selling the weight of the wrapping for the same rate as the meat. The wrapping is always weighed in, or has been. It is within the judgment and power of the purchaser whether he shall buy meat wrapped or not. He can buy the same pieces in the unwrapped condition if he wishes. On some of our packages the net weight is stamped."

Fire at Cudahy's.
A brick fire broke out in Cudahy's best house dressing room last evening about 11 o'clock. The dressing room is built on a bridge over Thirty-third street, west of the beef house, and occupies considerable space there. This bridge support was burned down and the building destroyed and fell in a ruin in the street. The quiet night saved a disastrous fire, for the building,

being entirely of wood, burned fiercely. The fireman were called promptly and soon had the fire extinguished. It is thought the fire was caused by matches in the clothing of some of the men. The damage will not be over \$5,000.

Clearing Up Diamond Mystery.
The South Omaha police are on the point of clearing up a mysterious diamond robbery which took place in South Omaha several weeks ago. Ed. Gates, a well-known man in the city, lost several valuable diamonds from his person. He came to South Omaha in a befuddled state and was conducted from the street car by supposed friends, taken to a South Omaha lodging house, drugged, stripped of his diamonds, his clothing, even to his shoes, and then thrown into an alley, where he lay for hours unconscious. The police have been puzzled over the case for a long time, until a family quarrel between the participants led one to tip it off to the South Omaha officers. The proprietor of the lodging house was at once arrested, as well as several who are supposed to be accomplices or to have knowledge of the affair. The whereabouts of the diamonds has not been revealed. Until that is divulged the police are loath to place unnecessary imputations on the character of the man under arrest. The wife says she can compel him to admit his connection with the affair.

The man's name is Manered Alden, who has been running the Alden house, the stand formerly known as the Formanek hotel, 418 North Twenty-fifth street. Miss Annie H. Formanek is one of the witnesses. Several conflicting stories were told by the wife of Alden. Apparently she did not know what had been done with them.

One of the most valuable witnesses was arrested last evening. His name is Fritz Koedler.

The Formanek girl admits being in the room where the robbery was committed. Alden denies that he knows where the gems are hidden. He said: "Bring in the folks who were there that night, then we'll see who is most to blame." It is likely that several more arrests will follow. Mrs. Alden was put in jail, as well as her husband, with the hope she might reveal the hidden diamonds.

Schindler President of New Bank.
Now that the Live Stock National bank has gained control of its building the corporation is ready to disclose completely its identity. The president of the company is

Dr. C. M. Schindler. This is a great surprise to the doctor's many friends. M. L. Lord of Glenwood, Ia., is to be cashier. The subordinate officers of the company have not yet been filled. The company hopes to be in the building ready for business by November 1. Active preparations are in progress. The old partitions are being torn out and the drugstore is to be shifted to the northeast corner of the McDonald block, with the entrance facing on Twenty-fourth street. The partition between the drug store and the saloon room formerly occupied by John Richea is being removed and this will make the room to be used by the bank. The entrance to the bank will be the same as the present entrance to the drug store. The directors of the bank were elected some time ago. They are all well known men in South Omaha. They are: C. M. Schindler, M. L. Lord, W. P. Adkins, E. L. Howe, A. L. Bergquist, W. C. Lambert, E. B. Shugart, Mr. Gladhill of Sary county and Mr. Bersehm of Council Bluffs.

Bottling Works Are Convenient.
The new bottling works of the Jetter Brewing company have been in operation for the last three days and with the practical test show many conveniences and much saving of time. The plant is almost automatic throughout. There is no lifting of cases in the building. The empty cases are sent to the basement in a chute and carried along by an endless chain to the cleanser. The bottles are loaded by hand in a conveyor which draws them through a strong lye solution for seventeen minutes. They are then dumped out in a vat, rinsed and drained. They go to the lifting wheel, where they are loaded with beer, passing on they are automatically capped and sent to the pasteurizing vats. They are thoroughly sterilized in every particular, and then put in the cases, which have been conveyed to the most convenient point on the basement below by the endless chain. The capacity of the plant is 24,000 bottles per day. Under the main floor is the tank room, where the day's supply of beer is stored. There is a government revenue inspector who has charge here and not a drop of beer can be drawn from any of the tanks without the platform adopted by the republican state convention. "It is a good outline for continued policies of reform," he said.

Big Receipts of Sheep.
Omaha beat Chicago yesterday by 4,000 head in receipts of sheep. The total for the day was 13,909 head. The total for the present week is 67,662 head. If the big receipts continue proportionately, all records for sheep for a week's run will be completed smashed. Notwithstanding the big run, the market has kept the barns clear. Sales have been active. New buyers have appeared daily. Few sheep have been sent to other markets by the same parties who sent them here. The hog market has strengthened materially in the last week, tending moderately upward in

Nothing but "Zodiac" stick pins and charms, with the September sign, will give Ak-Bar-Ben visitors "good luck," according to jewelers and furnishers, who have received lots of the latest fad in seasonable jewelry.

"Swastika," the Japanese good luck sign, has been abandoned; the Amazons, from the land of the Amazons, and the sapphires, from the Yellowstone hills, have all gone with the borquo pearls, culled from the Mississippi claims, and the little metal signs of the astrologers' zodiac will be quite the fashion.

Nothing is being worn in bracelets and brooches which grandmother used to wear will equal the zodiac pins for the next few weeks. They are simple little pins in different colors of enamel, and in twelve different varieties, one for each month of the year. In the enamel the signs of the zodiac are set in silver, making an odd but attractive ornament.

The best thing about the zodiac pins is that they will be inexpensive. None of them are set with diamonds, as yet, and the chances are good for the men and women who are fond of jewelry keeping within a reasonable price in buying the new pins.

Another feature of the fad is that the pins may be worn in any position, as the little pieces of enamel are square. Wearing one will not be like wearing a horse shoe pin. Most people wear the horse-shoes with the points turned down, and when they fail to gather good luck with them do not discover the difficulty until too late. "The trouble is that when the points are turned down the good luck all runs out," said a jeweler in speaking of good luck pins.
