Fifty or Hundred Per Cent Raise Urged by Stock Yards.

RAILROADS OPPOSE THE PLAN Officials of Various Corporations Interested Confer and Railways

Will Make Answer in

To make a substantial increase in the switching charges at the Union stock yards at South Omaha was the object of the meeting between the representatives of the stock yards company and prominent railroad officials Thursday at South Omaha. The railroad men at the conference were: J. A. Munroe, freight traffic manager of the Union Pacific; C. E. Spens, general freight agent of the Burlington; J. E. Utt, general agent of the Rock Island, and C.

L. Lane, assistant general freight agent of

the Union Pacific. The stock yards company wishes to raise its switching charges from 50 to 100 per cent, giving as the reason the increased cost of material and labor. The ratiroads are combating the raise on the grounds that all material is costing them just as much and has increased just as materially as it has for the stock yards company and they on the other hand have had their revenues on stock materially reduced by the action of the legislature in cutting down the rates stock materially reduced by the action |
