

GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Bears in Evidence at Opening of Trade Friday.

CABLES ON WHEAT ARE LOWER

Prices on Corn Erratic and on Oats Weakly, While Buyers Are in Evidence on All Kinds of Grain.

OMAHA, Sept. 27, 1907. The grain market was calmer this morning than the opening of the week, but realized a break on lower cables and lower north-west markets. Prices were better than on some of the previous days, but easier at the start on lower cables and lower north-west markets.

Corn was some lower at the start on some selling and on lower cables. Prices were erratic, sliding up and down easy on the crowd started to hammer them down but all long stuff was quickly taken and opened at 60c and closed at 57c.

Oats were wobbly at the opening and the crowd started to hammer them down but all long stuff was quickly taken and opened at 40c and closed at 37c.

Wheat was wobbly at the opening and the crowd started to hammer them down but all long stuff was quickly taken and opened at 1.00 and closed at 97c.

Local grain market was quiet. Receipts of wheat were 1,100,000 bushels and shipments were 1,000,000 bushels.

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NEW YORK STOCKS AND BONDS

Bear Party is Successful in Forcing Prices to Lower Level.

MARKET IS WITHOUT SUPPORT

Harriman Sell Off on Rumor of Indictment of Head of System at San Francisco—Steel and Copper Lower.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—The bear party in the speculation had good success today in forcing prices of stocks to a lower level and incidentally in forcing some liquidation. The market was without support and demand was torpid pending the clearing up of various factors of uncertainty in the situation.

The call money market was affected appreciably by the preparations for the October 1 settlements, loans at the stock exchange being very tight on Monday, the last day of the month.

The preliminary estimates of the week's currency movement gave this consideration as well as this, reduced this in a large decline in cash holdings of the banks, the estimates running from \$150,000 to \$200,000.
