SCOUTING FAITH IN MADSTONES

Stimney Corner Traditions Recalled by Death of an Indian Cure-All. A dispatch from Newcastle, Ind., announcing the death of a Mr. Henry Bunbury of that place adds: "He was the owner of the celebrated Bunday madstone, which has brought hundreds of persons afflicted with various forms of infection to this city for treatment. Mr. Bunbury always kept it about his person, or in a safety deposit vault in a local bank. This relates to a common superstition which has existed for a long time and will probably continue to exist much longer. The so-called madstone is a calcareous or many formation popularly believed to have the power of overing hydrophobia by absorbing the poison when applied to the wound. The popular belief is that it possesses a specific affinity for hydrophobic virus; that when applied to the bitten place it draws off the poison is absorbed, and then drops off, when, if placed in warm milk or water, it gives out the poison as a greenish yellow steam. If any such stone exists, or even has existed, it differs fundamentally from all other stones in the alleged quality of possessing a specific attraction for a particular kind of poison. As this alleged quality is entirely foreign to all natural stones, those who possess what they call madstones ascribe a mysterious origin to them, as having been found in the stomach of some animal in the head of a snake, etc. The Bunday madstone is said to have been found in the stomach of a wild deer and to have been a valued possession of the Bunday family for more than 100 years; and to have saved a great many persons from hydrophobia. It is said the last owner of the Bunday stone accumulated a fortune by its use during a long term of years. Popular traditions and folklore theories are hard to put down, but as a matter of fact the so-called madstone has no recognition whatever in science. A publication of the American Philosophical Society of 1888 says: 'Among the various individuals in Pennsylvania who profess ability in exorcism and charms, we occasionally find one who is reputed to possess a madstone. These pebbles are of various sizes, and appear to have been selected on account of some peculiarity of color or form. A specimen which had a high reputation in the state from which it had been brought was described by the present writer as consisting of a worn piece of white felspar and possessing none of the properties of absorption attributed to it.' Scientists can classify all the stones alleged to be madstones, but no scientist has ever given the slightest credence to the qualities claimed for them. Sir Walter Scott in 'The Tailorman' gave his endorsement of a certain alleged madstone, but the Wizard of the North was far from being a scientist, and on this case his assertions of virtue in the alleged madstone was so incredible as to be ridiculous. But everything went with Sir Walter Scott when he was writing a story. That is right, but facts and fiction are essentially different, and the fact remains that the so-called madstone has no recognition in science, nor is there any well authenticated case of such a stone having shown the qualities claimed for it by its owners. Such claims are supported only by chimney corner tradition, and common credulity—Indianapolis News.

SNAKES SCOOT FOR TIMBER

Astonishing Effect of an Irish Tano on a Colony of Rattle-snakes. District Passenger Agent Paul S. Millspaugh, of the Lehigh Valley railroad at Ithaca, N. Y., asserts that the company for which he works has the most wonderful trainer of rattlesnakes in its employ that there is in the United States. "Why, up in the northern part of the state," says Millspaugh, "one of our branch lines is a gravel bank extending from the track to the rocky wooded hillside half a mile away. The region thereabouts is very wild, and therein abide many animals, among them rabbits, squirrels, and snakes, the latter in great abundance. It is customary to keep at the bank two or three gravel engines and a steam shovel. We also have a man on guard to see that the machinery is not molested, particularly in the months the bank is not used. But the place is so lonesome that it's hard to keep watchmen there. We have had three or four in the last three years and they all quit. Last fall we got hold of a happy-go-lucky Irishman, who is good company for himself, and we sent him up to the wild country. After getting accustomed to his new job this son of Erin set to work to establish friendly relations with the dumb denizens of the woods and succeeded admirably. "One day, while walking along a rocky bank, he almost stepped on a huge rattlesnake. The rattle was inclined to show fight, but the Irishman, seeing a chance for another friend, managed to trap it and carry it home with him. For many days the rattle kept its distance and the watchman learned that friendship with a snake was a difficult proposition. "In time the snake became quiet and later, absolutely tame. It would writh about the floor of the shanty and curl itself up at its master's feet like a pet pooch. It would eat food out of the Irishman's hands and began to follow him around. Soon there came six little snakes and they, too, at first were suspicious. But mother snake told them it was all right, and in the course of time they became as tame as the parent. "The rattles of the snake were of different sizes and the Irishman conceived a musical scheme. He lined them all in a row, with their tails up in the air, shaking
