NEW YORK, May 19.—A growing realtation of the conditions which confront
he world's cotton trade resulted Saturay in a wild market, prices having adanced shortly after the opening some 15
r 20 points. Toward the close heavy
iquidation on the part of local traders,
whose policy it is to close the week free
of speculative commitments, caused a local

has not lost any of its inherent strength

There are a few who will have the tenerity to sell the market short in the face of a government report that will probably indicate the lowest condition on record and may suggest a crop of much under 12,000,000 bales, and so far as the immediate present is concerned the depiction of American supplies goes on apace. The stock of cotton at all the United States ports last evening was only 508,000 bales. Of this 150,000 ba.es are in New York and confidently held in the expectation of much higher prices; 107,000 bales are on shipboard, not cleared, and at least 150,000 bales are unavailable for the liquidation of contract deliveries. There remains, therefore, hardly more than 103,000 bales of cotton at the United States ports actually available for the uses of the trade. The quantity of cotton that is coming forward is daily decreasing and only comes forward because it is already disposed of. The reaction which the market is having as it reaches from day to day higher levels are incident only to its healthy progress toward the figure it justifies by existing conditions, which, personally, I believe to be at least 12 or 13 cents a nounds and probably much higher, unless ideal conditions for the development of a crop, already seriously injured, prevail uninterruptedly from now to the end of the growing season.
