LQUAL RIGHTS CLUB BANQUET

Hundred and Fifty Attend and Liston to Some Interesting Addresses.

CHN J. RYDER ACTS AS TOASTMASTER

Ex-Congressman John L. Kennedy and Charles A. Goss Are the Principal Orators of the Evening.

Nearly 160 men sat down to the first anwual banque of the Equal Rights Club of Douglas County at O'Brien's cafe Thursday night. It was a feast of political reason and a flow of civic soul. The accomplishments of the republican party in its battle for the people against the corporations and the redomned piedues of the party, both in the state and the nation, were reviewed and plans made for a continuation of the great work begun.

The feast part of the program lasted nearly two hours and the flow of soul which followed lasted an equal time. John J. Hyder presided as toastmaster. In introducing the speakers he made reference to the work accomplished by the prestdent at Washington and the governor at Lincoln. He also referred touchingly to the late Edward Rosewater, voicing amid applause the sentiment of the gathering that he might have lived to see the accomplishment of the reforms for which he had made a life-long fight.

United States District Attorney Charles A. Goss spoke on "Roosevelt and Organization." He decried the citizen who stays at home when campaigns are going on and then criticises the men nominated er elected to an office. "Every man should have ideals," he said. "Roosevelt is a man of ideals. And the good citizen is he who is willing to get into the fight and do his best to put his ideals into operation. He should work disinterestedly and effectively. The result of such united, conscientious work will be the evolving of a government of the people in fact as well

E. F. Moriarity, one of the organizers of the club and its president, explained the object for which it is working, namely, equal rights to all. He declared the club stands for the doctrines and principles. enunciated by Roocevelt,

as in theory."

John L. Kennedy prophesied that in the next national campaign the greatest issue will be tariff revision. "The foremost leaders of the party today realize that the time has come for intelligent revision of the tariff," he said. "This, of course, means republican revision. The dogma of demouracy, 'tariff for revenue only,' would mean disaster for the country. What we need is reasonable protection to our manufactures and laborers and reasonable prices to the people for the manufactured product. The other great issue of the campaign will be the election of some man who will carry out the reforms which have been instituted during the administration of President Roosevelt."

N. P. Dodge, jr., spoke briefly, reviewing the work of the late legislature.
