## CUMMINS OUT FOR SENATOR

Governor Announces Himself a Candidate for the Allison Succession.

### TALK ABOUT DELEGATES IS STARTED

Carl L. Spencer Sentenced to Five Years in Prison for Theft of Package of Money from Des Moines Bank.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)  
DES MOINES, May 28.—(Special.)—The announcement was made today that Governor Cummins would be a candidate for Allison, subject to the decision of the voters at the primary election.

Already there is some disposition on the part of republicans to look about and find who is most available for delegates to the next republican national convention. It is assumed that the national convention will be held somewhat early because the campaign appears to have opened earlier than usual and the state convention will be held as early as in March or April. On one occasion Iowa held a state convention in February to name delegates to a national convention. One of the first names brought out for delegate-at-large is that of ex-Senator A. B. Funk of Spirit Lake, whose candidacy is suggested from the Eleventh district. Funk has been a very ill man and has been in California for six months, but it is stated that he has sufficiently recovered so that he will return to Iowa next month and resume business. He was a candidate for delegate-at-large at the opening of the last campaign, but withdrew in the interest of harmony and his withdrawal made it possible to send a delegation to the national convention without any fight at all. It is believed now that Funk can be selected delegate-at-large to the convention without opposition. Others suggested as possible candidates with him are Thomas D. Hoaly, Fort Dodge; Harvey Ingraham, Des Moines, and Joe R. Lann, Davenport.

It is not known whether Funk has given the matter any consideration, but in the Eleventh district where he has been for many years recognized as a leader among the republicans there is said to be much sentiment in favor of his selection for the place. It is expected that before many weeks there will be many other candidates announced and much discussion of names.

### Debate on Constitution Opened

This evening there was commenced a series of meetings where the voters of Des Moines will be addressed by public speakers on the commission plan of city government, which will be voted on at a special election next month. A meeting was held at Scandia hall, addressed by prominent persons advocating the new system. Tomorrow evening a joint debate will be held at Labor assembly hall between C. O. Holly and Walt Butler on the same subject. Both are prominent democrats, the former being opposed to the plan and the latter for it. It is expected there will be a number of similar discussions in different parts of the city and a good many meetings.

### Spencer Case Disposed Of

In the federal court today Judge McPherson finally disposed of the case of Carl N. Spencer, found guilty last week of embezzlement from the Des Moines National bank, sentencing him to five years. Spencer made only a technical defense to the accusation, claiming that as the money was money collected by the bank for others and it was not the property of the bank directly, he was not guilty of embezzlement from the bank. He had previously confessed to the taking of the money. The defense was pushed by the bonding company, which had made good to the bank. There has been much sympathy for Spencer from the fact that personally he was a clean and upright man in other respects and that he lived frugally and the money taken was for the purpose of trying to secure relief for a son who was ill and had long been a burden upon him. The case will be appealed on technical grounds.

In reading the sentence Judge McPherson said that Spencer was to be commended for the fact that he did not add perjury to his crime and that he aided the officers of the bank in finding the exact state of the conditions of the bank's books. Judge McPherson said that were it in his power he would give Spencer a shorter sentence than he did, but that as the law fixed the minimum sentence, he was powerless to do anything else.

### RAILROAD OFFICIALS IN WRECK

Special of President Harris Collides with Accommodation.  
YORK, Neb., May 28.—(Special Telegram.)—Through a misunderstanding of orders the local Kansas City & Omaha accommodation train from the north ran into a special passenger on the main track of the Burlington near the rear of the depot in the yards here.

The private car of President Harris of the Burlington was attached to the train, and with him in the car were Second Vice President Willard of the Burlington; James N. Hill, vice president of the Northern Pacific, and Chief Engineer Calvert of the Burlington. These, together with the regular passengers, suffered nothing worse than a shaking up.

The engineer and fireman on the special tried to bring the train to a full stop and just before the collision both jumped and were unhurt. ### NO MOTIVE KNOWN FOR MURDER

Humor There Was Trouble Between Wives of Dead Men.  
NORFOLK, Neb., May 28.—(Special.)—No motive has yet been brought out for the tragedy northeast of here which resulted in the slaying of his brother and himself at the hands of Henry Kneis. It is generally believed that the wife of the murderer and suicide knows more about the motive than she has told. It is believed that trouble has existed between the two wives. When Conrad Kneis, the sturdy old father of the two dead men, drove into the farmyard where the tragedy occurred, he was ignorant of what had taken place. He found one son lying dead with two bullets in his body, on the bare ground awaiting the other. It was not until his other son had just been carried home to die from self-inflicted wounds. The old father fell backward in a faint at the news.

There are stories of trouble months ago over geese, over hayland, over a horse out in the barbed wire, over a dog fight and of trouble between the two men's wives. But no fresh motive was developed by the coroner's inquest.

### German Lutheran Appointments.

SEWARD, Neb., May 28.—(Special.)—The Nebraska district conference of the German Evangelical Synod of North America held its eighteenth annual conference at the German Evangelical church of Seward from last Thursday morning until Sunday noon. There were present about forty members. Services were held Thursday morning by Rev. Koehler of Falls City; Friday evening by Rev. Krausner of Platt Center, Saturday evening by Rev. Beck of Lorton, Neb., Sunday afternoon by Rev. Krueger of Steiuaner and in the afternoon by Rev. Matzner of Wayne, Neb., and Rev. Abbele from Osage. The next conference will be held at Gladstone, Neb. The officers for the next year are: Rev. Krueger, president; Rev. Abbele, vice president; Rev. Tester, secretary; Rev. A. Wolt, treasurer.

### Girl Commits Suicide.

ASHLAND, Neb., May 28.—(Special.)—Sylvia Stubbs, a 17-year-old high school girl, whose parents live on a farm a few miles west of Ashland, committed suicide last evening by taking chloroform at the home of Mrs. S. McIntyre, where she was boarding. It is thought she had become despondent over a love affair, as she had been keeping company steadily with a young man of Ashland. She spent Sunday with her parents, west of Ashland and returned to the city yesterday morning. It was noticed that she had been weeping, and during the day her teacher asked her if she was feeling ill. She replied in the negative and no more was thought of the matter.

### Fireman Loses a Foot.

ALLIANCE, Neb., May 28.—(Special Telegram.)—John Meints, a Burlington fireman, had his foot so badly crushed under the wheels of the switch engine here this morning that the leg part way to the knee was amputated later. The engine was being taken to the house and Meints was on the rear footboard and had just given a signal when for some unaccountable reason he fell from the board. The young man is single and his parents reside at York, Neb.

### Sunday School Convention.

HASTINGS, Neb., May 28.—(Special Telegram.)—The Nebraska State Sunday School association will hold its fortieth annual convention in this city June 12, 13 and 14. Programs for the meeting are being distributed by the local committee, of which J. W. Hoque is chairman. About 1,500 visitors are expected. This will be one of the largest conventions ever held in Hastings.


### Killed by Switch Engine.

PLATTSMOUTH, Neb., May 28.—(Special.)—While returning to his home last evening about 11:30 o'clock Frank Lahona, aged 25 years, was run over and instantly killed by a switch engine in the Burlington yards. The body was buried this afternoon.

### JACK FROST IS STILL KING

Cold Wave Extends from Rocky Mountains to Atlantic Coast.

### WEATHER MAN UNABLE TO EXPLAIN

Says It is Due to Areas of High Pressure, but Does Not Know What Produces These Phenomena.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Remarkably unreasonable weather, with a cold wave extending throughout the country east of the Rocky mountains, thermometers in some sections registering the lowest temperature for the season in many years, is reported by the weather bureau. Tonight the bureau issued the following special forecast:

Frost warnings have been issued for the middle Atlantic states and the eastern lower lake region, western Colorado, east Wyoming, Utah and northern Arizona, with warnings of freezing temperature for western Wyoming.

Added to this, flood warnings have been issued for the lower Rio Grande river valley and supplementary warnings for the Red river valley in Arkansas.

Weather bureau officials say there is no immediate indication of summer weather anywhere. Heavy frosts are reported to the bureau from Michigan and other states of the lake region. The cold wave is particularly severe in the southwest and is due, according to the weather experts, to the heavy rains in that part of the country.

Forecasters Harry C. Frankensfield of the weather bureau tonight said:

"The reason for the cold weather we have had during the last two or three months

is that the areas of high pressure have moved eastward from the northern portion of the country almost continuously. And these have caused cold north winds. That is the only reason I can give for the cold weather areas. As to what makes these high areas keep up all this season is more than I can tell."

Not since 1882 has the abnormal weather been approached in this part of the country. It is 7 degrees below the normal temperature for this month. A temperature of 44 degrees was recorded at the weather bureau early today and 29 degrees at 3 o'clock tonight and the mercury is expected to drop considerably tonight.
