FOR COURT OF ARBITRATION

Governor Gillette of California Has Plan to Avoid Numerous Labor Troubles.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 3,-The creation by constitutional amendment of a state court of compulsory arbitration to assume control and adjust all disputes arising be-At teween employers and labor organizations is advocated by Governor Gillette. The governor has given the subject considerable consideration and has mapped out a plan of organization of a court of three members, which will form part of the judiciary system of California. It would have power to compel settlement by arbitration of labor disputes, especially when the operation of public utilities, such as telephone or street car systems, would be involved.

The proposition will be discussed at a meeting this afernoon between Governor Gillette and the conciliation committee of the Civic league.
