It has been decided already that the board will not put in a blanket joint rate, covering the whole state with every commodity. and the 80 per cent plan, which was proposed by the Des Molnes experts in rate naking, will not be considered at all. The rates which will be put in are likely to be special rates for certain commodities at certain places, not to afford competition, but to enable business to be done at all. The legislature placed the whole matter in the hands of the board, with power to act as
