The market opened firm on a good demand, which was based upon higher prices at Liverpool in the face of yesterday's 3d decline on the local board. Later, however, prices declined about it because of excellent weather conditions in this country and Canada for the growing crop. The weakness became more acute as trading progressed and by noon prices were fully 2c below the early quotation. The market railled sharply and all of the loss was regained. The recovery was due to active demand by shorts who were aroused to action by a large number of reports from Kansas which declared that the full effect of the recent frost is now showing up in the wheat fields of that state. The foreign situation also influenced the advance. The Hungarian crop report estimated the wheat yield of that country this year will be 75,000,009 bu less than last year and a dispatch from Paris claimed that a bill has been introduced in the French Chamber of Deputies temporarily suspending the import duty on wheat. NEW YORK, June 5.—The early drop in prices of stocks today served to throw discredit on yesterday's upward movement. When this fact had taken hold of the minds of operators they became profoundly distrustful and reduced their transactions to almost nominal proportions. It was taken as a bad aign of the tone of the speculation that the increase in the dividend on American Smelling should be followed by a sharp decline in stocks, even though the increase had been expected as the impelling motive for the buying which held the price up yesterday. EARTHQUAKE IS RECORDED Instruments at Washington Reveal Disturbance of Earth's

Crust South of City. WASHINGTON, June 5 .- A distant earthquake shock was recorded by the selsmo graphs at the weather bureau beginning a about 10:29 last night and lasting for nearly an hour. The maximum amount of motion was very small. While it is impracticable to determine the location or origin of the quake, based solely on the seismograph records, the weather bureau officials believe that it was not more than 2,000 or 3,000 miles distant and probably to the south of Washington.
