OLD LAW HAS BEEN IGNORED County Board is About to Begin the Checking of Treasurer's Records.

The county commissioners have decided to employ an expert accountant to check over the records of the county treasurer's office for the purpose of complying with a statute which has been entirely ignored in Douglas county. This statute requires the county clerk to keep a close check on the treasurer's accounts, and in order to do this he is expected at the beginning of a new term to charge up to the incoming official the balance turned over to him by the outgoing treasurer, delinquent taxes and all tax lists as they are turned over to him. Against this the treasurer is allowed credits as provided in the statute. This statute has never been complied with, but the commissioners, at the request of County 83 E.

It will be necessary to go back to the organization of Douglas county and check over every tax list in order to determine the amount of delinquent taxes to charge up to the treasurer.
