AFFAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

Railroads and Officials Confer Over Erection of U Street Viaduct.

DELAY IS ASKED BY THE FORMER

Eighth Grade Commencement Exercises Held at High School Auditorium, When Ninety Receive Certificates.

The city council and other officials held an important conference with the officials of the Rock Island and Union Pacific roads yesterday afternoon on the matter of the proposed viaduct at Twenty-fifth and U streets. The city desired the immediate construction, but the Rock Island was not so eager and tried to secure a promise of delay. The nearest to an agreement was upon the matter of the general direction of the viaduct and its site. The landing at the northeast end will be at the alley west of Twenty-fourth, thence it will cross the two roads and the property of the Rock Island to the northeast corner of lot 16 owned by Swift and Company; thence it will go south on the line between the Rock Island and Swift properties to Y street. The entire distance is 1,400 feet. The viaduct will be twenty-two feet in the roadway, with a single sidewalk, and will cost \$300,000. Each railroad will bear a share of the expense. The city engineer will be instructed to draw plans and specifications of the proposed viaduct and these will be submitted to the railroads for consideration. It probably will be a year before the work is completed. J. B. Berry represented the interests of the Rock Island and C. B. Dundy and R. L. Huntley the Union Pacific. W. Scott King attended the conference in the interests of the Union stock yards. Mr. Berry promised to lay the matter before the officials of his road as soon as the engineer furnishes him with the plans. The direction of the proposed viaduct was suggested by Mr. King and of four propositions examined proved the most feasible for all purposes.

Eighth Grade Commencement.

Last night was the occasion of the eighth grade commencement at the high school auditorium. Ninety pupils from the various school buildings were given their certificates admitting them to the high school next year. Besides the ninety finishing this term, there were seventy-five who finished last semester. This makes the probable attendance at the high school next year about 155 for the freshman class. The attendance of the pupils was very much restricted on account of the heavy rain. A chorus of the eighth grade pupils furnished three numbers of the excellent program. Miss Genevieve Rafferty rendered a solo of American melodies on the violin. The speech of the evening was made by John L. McCasue of Omaha, on the subject, "Wanted, a Man." Dr. C. M. Schindel presented the certificates. Rev. Andrew Renwick assisted in the devotions.

Supposed Saloon Robber Caught.

With the arrest of Edward Lehane, the police think they have captured the man who has been breaking into half a dozen or more saloons during the last six months. Lehane was arrested early yesterday morning while trying to sell eight bottles of whiskey, which he had in the pockets of his coat. He was in the condition which the police call "snaky," and as soon as he was deprived of the liquor he weakened and was willing to confess all of his exploits if he might have a few good drinks. He confessed to having taken the liquor from Lewon's saloon on Twenty-fourth and N streets. He is thought to be the man who took liquor from Dennis Cushing's saloon last week. His game is a simple one. He would go into a saloon and hide if possible, feigning to be drunk, which he evidently was most of the time. If he was discovered he was simply put out as a common drunk, but if he remained in the saloon until all was favorable and then made his robbery and broke out instead of breaking in. The circumstances of half a dozen late robberies point to the same process.

Hotel Clerk in Trouble.

Another man whom the police have taken up is Ed Scott. He was arrested under a complaint by "Moggy" Bernstein. He is the night clerk at Trull's lodging house, where he is said to have rented a room to Irwin Parkhurst and his daughter on April 1 last. It is said that the pair, who are mere children, sought to rent a room for the night after having walked from Omaha and were allowed to register as man and wife. They were captured by the police just after the room was entered and brought before the juvenile court. Now Scott, who rented the room, is arrested under the charge of aiding and abetting a delinquent child. The penalty is \$500 and a possible imprisonment for six months.

CHINESE AND INDIAN CASES

Leo Lung On and Charles Green Rainbow Have Hearings on Appeal.

Assistant District Attorney A. W. Lane has returned from St. Paul, where he argued the appeals in the United States circuit court of appeals in the deportation case of Leo Lung On and the habeas corpus matter in the case of Charles Green Rainbow.
Leo Lung On, a Chinaman, was ordered deported by Judge W. H. Munger in the United States court for the district of Nebraska, whereupon Leo Lung On appealed to the circuit court of appeals from Judge Munger's order.
Charles Green Rainbow was one of the three Indian policemen at the Winnebago Indian agency, who sought to forcibly remove Thomas L. Sloan from the vicinity of the agency. Sloan being there as a collector to secure the payment of certain claims he had against certain of the Indians, which was in violation of the agency rules prohibiting collectors from being within specified limits of the agency house on Indian day. Mr. Sloan subsequently had Charles Green Rainbow arrested for assault, the arrest being made by the sheriff of Thurston county. The United States immediately thereafter applied for the release of Rainbow on a writ

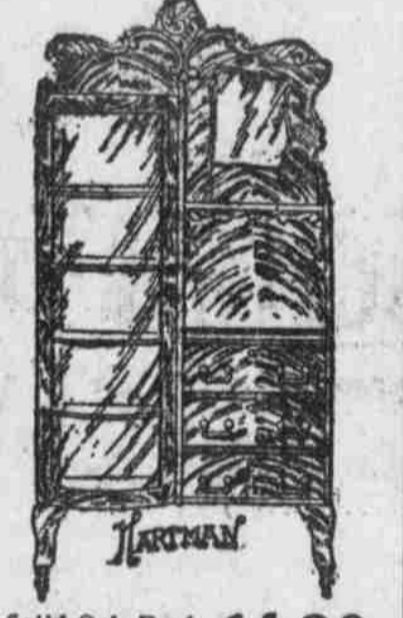

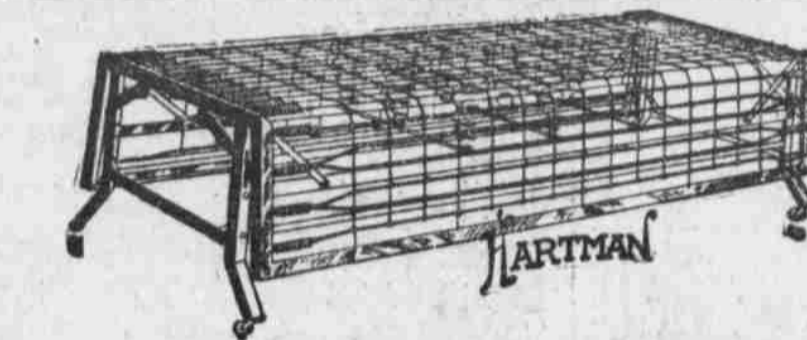

DOG MUST DIE FOR THE BITE

Texas is Doomed When Little Girl Shows Prints of His Teeth.

"Texas" is the name of a dog which was sentenced to death and destruction in police court Friday morning at the close of a trial in which a 12-year-old girl was one of the witnesses against the canine. Texas is a cocker spaniel and was in court himself, but he only wagged his tail at master when Judge Crawford repeated the dread words.
Annie Philip, 2130 South Seventeenth street, testified the dog ran at and bit her at the knee, when she passed through the alley where the dog lived. She showed a physician's certificate stating he had scratched

her and burned the wound. On the other hand J. Roth, the master, said the dog was always kept chained, but it was impossible to get around the fact that the little girl had been bitten, when passing in a public place.

"You will pay a fine of \$1 and give up the dog to be destroyed," was the sentence, and Roth sat down on a bench to get the full meaning of the words. Texas meanwhile placing his forelegs on his lap and wagging his tail as though to urge his master not to mourn. Later Roth's fine was remitted on his promise to give up the dog immediately.

MRS. LYTLE GETS ALIMONY

Awarded Six Thousand Dollars in Addition to Seventy Dollars a Month.

Alimony to the amount of \$6,000 in addition to \$70 a month for the support of her child has been awarded Mrs. May E. Lytle in her suit for divorce from Edward Lytle, son of the late Judge Lytle. The decree was entered without protest from Mrs. Lytle, the provisions as to alimony having been agreed to in advance. Mrs. Lytle said her husband had deserted her October 3, 1904, and had not lived with her since. He is now living in Portland, Ore. Under the terms of the decree the alimony is to be paid at the rate of \$50 a month. He is also decreed to pay \$200 attorney fees. The claim for alimony is made a lien upon Mr. Lytle's property in Omaha which he inherited from his father's estate.
