Rev. L. Johnson of St. Louis and Marcus Beck of Blatr, Neb., were re-elected secretary and treasurer respectively. P. Clausen of Albert Lee, Minn., was re-elected one of the trustees. The election of the second trustee was postponed, it being stated that the man named, while still a member of the church, had joined a congregation which was not identified with the association. Rev. C. C. Cloth of Hampton and Rev. I. M. Hansen of Chicago were elected members of the board of education of the

Rev. A. Lund of Denmark, Wis., opened the morning services with prayer and address, while Rev. J. T. Lund of Sigux City opened the afternoon session with devotional exercises and a short address.
