Ornery to Animals—Charles Campbell, 228 South Twenty-fourth street, was arrested Monday on a warrant sworn out by Louis Betts, charging him with cruelty to animals. The complaint related that Campbell had hired a horse and buggy from Betts and whipped it in a manner far beyond humane treatment.

More Taxes Collected—With a tax levy of 58 mills less than last year the city and county treasurer reports collections of \$1,500,000 of the sum collected at this time last year, showing a much greater proportion of total tax collections. Last year was a record breaker in this regard and this year's result comes as somewhat of a surprise to the treasurer, who did not expect to beat last year's record.

Postmasters of Two States—Arrangements have about been completed for the Interstate meeting of the postmasters of Nebraska and Iowa to be held in Omaha June 25-26. Among the prominent officials to be present will be E. T. Bushnell, assistant postmaster general, and other officials from the post office department at Washington. From present indications the gathering will be the most largely attended meeting of postmasters ever held in the west.

Two Big Incorporations—Two heavily capitalized real estate companies have filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk. Their combined capital is \$50,000. The Magic City Realty company is a South Omaha corporation with Thomas J. Nolan, Thomas J. O'Neil and John Sauer as incorporators. The capital is \$200,000. Smith, in a petition for divorce from Beese Smith filed in district court Monday, declares one day in Denver after a family tiff Mrs. Smith went to his desk, took out their marriage certificate and tore it to shreds. He says she has an unbearable temper and has struck him several times because he remonstrated with her for going out at night and remaining away from home without giving him any explanation. She has also refused, he says, to cook his breakfasts and lunches and has forced him to get his meals at a restaurant.

Young Witness Still Missing—Everett King, the 14-year-old colored boy who is wanted as a witness in the hearing for a motion for a new trial in the case of Emoh Bok, colored, convicted of manslaughter, had not been located when court convened Monday morning and the hearing was continued again. The officers are scouring the city for young King, but though they have found trace of him several places they have been unable to find him. King made an affidavit to the effect his testimony at the trial was untrue and County Attorney English insists on examining him face to face before arguing the motion.

Contract for Phone House—Job contracts to Capital City Company for Seventy Thousand Dollars. The Capital City Brick and Pipe company has secured the contract for erecting the exchange building for the independent Telephone company in Chicago last week and bought the automatic exchange, which cost \$200,000. The company gave a \$100,000 bond to guarantee that the switchboard will be here at the end of ninety days and will be installed within sixty days thereafter in the new building. At the end of that time the new company expects to be ready for business.

TRUCE ON AUTO LICENSE Armistice Reached by Machine Men and City Inspector Pending Action of Council. POLICE LAY CRIME ON NEGRO

Arrest Will Washington as Man Who Killed Kaspar.

ITALIAN ALSO HELD IN PRISON

Theory of Officers is Gang of Colored Men Demanded Money as Kaspar Passed and Murder Ensued.

With the arrest Sunday evening of Antonio Albany, an Italian, and Will Washington, colored, Sunday morning, the police believe they now have the mystery of the murder of Anton Kaspar at Ninth street and Capitol avenue Friday night entirely cleared up and the guilty man in jail. The knife, with the long sharp blade, which was stuck so far into the victim's back that the murderer could not take it out again, and which has been used in former cuttings, is the clue left behind that threw the only ray of light on the case and led the police to the guilty man. It is developed that the theories of the officers are correct.

According to the theory of Captain Savage, chief of detectives, Kaspar passed a group of colored cocaine fiends drinking from a can in the alley back of Meadstrub & Colwell's saloon and was accosted by one of them and asked him for money with which to fill the bucket again. Kaspar refused to donate, the words are supposed to have passed, the negro to have drawn a knife, slashed Kaspar in the breast and then, as he started to run, driven the blade into the back to the hilt and could not take it out again.

Negro Gives the Tip. So much for police conjecture. An hour after Kaspar had run into the saloon trying to call attention to the handle protruding from his back, and died without telling anything about himself or his wound, Will Washington, a negro who had been discharged from jail that morning after serving a ten-day sentence as a cocaine fiend and vagrant, entered the police station and said he had seen an Italian, Antonio Albany, with the knife cleaning his finger nails at 8 o'clock in the evening.

During the night detectives circulated among the habitues of the lower world and Ernest Wilson and Art Walker, both colored, said they had seen a knife such as the one described in the hands of Will Washington. Furthermore, Mrs. Nettie Antokla, when she heard about the peculiar knife, sent word to the police that before his arrest, Washington had stolen her knife from her, and she described the weapon accurately, even to the missing name plate on one side. She said she had sent word to him to bring back her knife, but that he had never done so.

With these circumstances coming to light Washington was locked up at 5 o'clock Sunday morning, but in order to look up his story regarding Albany his arrest was kept secret until the Italian should also be found. Detectives located him at 9 o'clock Sunday evening and he was taken to jail, but the police do not believe he had any connection with the murder. Ernest Wilson was also held in jail.

Searching for a Clue. In searching for a possible motive for the killing it was learned Kaspar did not leave the tailor shop where he worked until after 7 o'clock and ate his supper at a directly street restaurant between 8 and 9. It is thought he must then have gone directly into the red light district, for at 9 o'clock he was dead. The police learned that a party of colored fiends were drinking beer in the alley from near which the trail of blood began and the supposition is that Kaspar, being the commonest house and the southern shipper may be called upon to explain before any more of his goods are handled in Omaha.

Uncle Sam Loses Appeal Judge Triebler Decides Against Government in Charles Green Habeas Corpus Case. 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The suit grew out of the arrest of Charles Green Rainbow, a Winnebago Indian policeman, by the state authorities on the charge of assault for ejecting Thomas L. Sloan, from the vicinity of the agency house, where he had gone to collect a bill from an Indian. Sloan had the Indian policeman arrested for assault on the ground that he was not legally vested with police authority. The United States authorities then sought to secure Charles Green Rainbow's release by habeas corpus process. Judge Triebler refused to grant the writ and hence the case was carried to the circuit court of appeals on a petition in error, which has just been denied by that court.
