Decide Upon Holding Company Plan to Take Real Estate.

JETTERS FORM ONE CORPORATION

Kruge Have Such Concern and Mets Brothers Are Contemplating the Organisation of One.

Omaha, and his wife, Bertha, executed and filed in the register of deeds office at the court house a warranty deed conveying to the Magic City Realty company 127 lots and in all but a few cases, the buildings and improvements thereon. The consideration for the deed is \$287,500. Most of the property is located in South Omahe and has heretofore been used by the Jetter Brewing company with which to operate its numerous shloons.

The Gibson law, which prohibits brewing companies from owning or operating saloons or engaging in the retail liquor business in any form, goes into effect July 1, and considerable speculation has been indulged in as to what steps the brewers would take to get around the provisions of the new law, although it has been intimated that holding companies would be formed.

Other brewers have taken or will take similar action to meet the provisions of the Gibson law. Some years ago the Krugs incorporated a holding concern which took over all real estate and made it unnecessary for the brewing company to take any action new. The Krugs' holding company is the Cassell Real Estate company. General J. C. Cowln, attorney for this corporation, says his clients are adequately provided for, that no real estate is now ! the hands of the brewing company.

Mets Bros. Have Company. The property of Mets Bros., which is used for saloen purposes will be bought by a corporation known as the Home Real Estate company, which has already been formed. Fred Mets will sever his connection with the brewing company and will have charge of the new corporations. The property to be transferred will amount to about \$275,000.


