## SPAIN'S NEW ROYAL NURSERY

**Was Planned by Queen Victoria in Accordance with Her Own Ideas.**

The rooms prepared in the palace at Madrid for the young Prince Alfonso are the product of his mother's planning in every detail. Queen Victoria has had to yield to Spanish prejudices in many matters, but in preparing the nursery for her baby she insisted on having her own way.

The suite is situated directly above the queen's bedroom and communicates with her apartments by a private staircase. It is on the sunny side of the palace and it consists of a day and a night nursery, a dining room, bath room, a dormitory for the attendants and a work room.

Green and white are the colors of the day nursery. On the walls is a continuous series of animal pictures.

Among the peculiarities of this room, which is to be the royal play room, is the fact that there is not a sharp corner in it. Every angle is rounded so that the stungling of the little feet may not result in cuts and bruises.

Another feature is that the room itself from floor to ceiling and every article in it, except the delicately rose-tinted carpet of English manufacture, is washable. The windows are protected without with hinged iron gratings of old-fashioned design.

The night nursery is adorned with three frescoes, "Morning," "Midday" and "Night." The first shows a baby awakening in a cradle flooded with sunshine, the second a little child eating and the third a little boy saying his evening prayers, kneeling by his bed.

The furniture is of mahogany, lacquered white. A frieze of grotesque figures borders the walls.

Young Alfonso will occupy the same crib that his father and grandfather slept in, but the queen has had it remodeled. It will be ornamented with two high pillars which support a canopy modeled on the Spanish crown. From this heavy drapery of lace flows to the ground.

The queen has had pillars, canopy and curtains removed. The court says she was afraid of the crown falling and crushing the infant. Most likely it is her modern approval of free circulation of air about the sleeping child that dictated the change.

All the rooms, though beautiful, are simple. They are planned and adorned in the child spirit. Queen Victoria is something of a fresh air fiend; she inherits it from her mother, who had the royal nursery thoroughly ventilated, and it is said she has made sure of it to a degree that fills her Spanish attendants with wonder and some dismay.

W. C. T. U. Asks Co-operation of Clubs.

The National Women's Christian Temperance Union has recommended the following resolution to club women and asked that they co-operate by adopting it and working for it:

"Whereas, Many of the magazines and newspapers of the day carry advertisements of alcoholic liquors, and such advertisements and pictures which should not be allowed to enter the home; therefore be it

Resolved, That we will choose for our homes, so far as possible, the newspapers and magazines which carry no such advertisements; that we will in a spirit of frankness and kindness, publicly advise and editors to remove from their publications objectionable advertisements; moreover, we will remonstrate against such advertisements and pictures being posted in public places, believing them to be a disgrace to the community; and it is the duty of town and municipal authorities to prevent such displays on bill boards or in other public places."
