

AUDITORS DISCUSS REPORT

Say They Have Not Information to Make it Complete as Demanded.

HEARING IN RAILROAD CASE

Dr. Wilson of Table Rock Appointed Inspector by State Board of Health After a Long-Drawn-Out Contest.

From a Staff Correspondent. LINCOLN, June 24.—(Special.)—Representatives of the auditing department of the various railroads doing business in Nebraska met with the state railway commission today and discussed the form of the annual report to be filed with the commission.

The commission gave the railroad men to understand it had no authority to change the law and therefore the annual report would have to conform to the state law, notwithstanding some of the information asked for may be superfluous.

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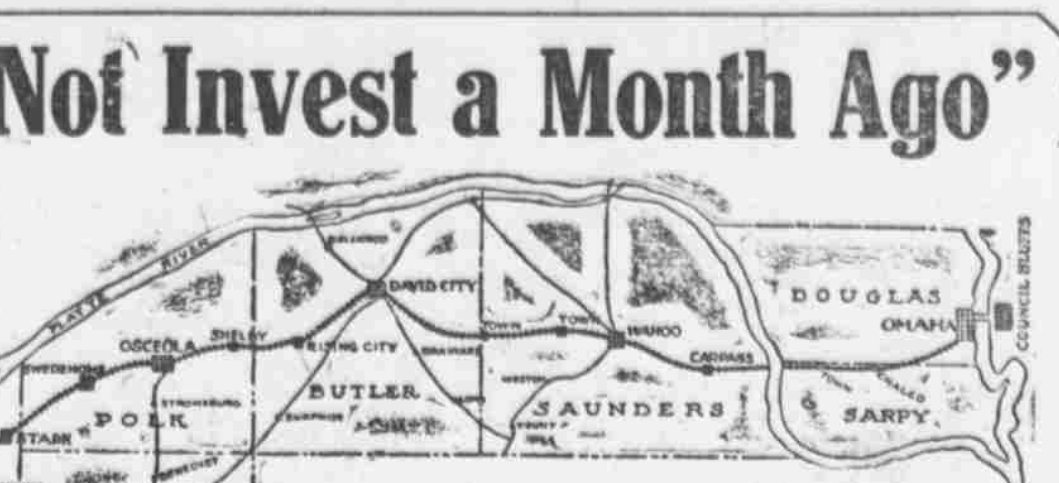
