CLAW HERE ON BUSINESS

Member of Big Theater Firm Visits Omaha on Professional Matter... Marc Klaw, Jr., of the big amusement enterprise firm of Klaw & Erlanger, New York, is an Omaha visitor, enroute eastward from the Pacific coast. "I expect to remain here for three or four days," said Mr. Klaw, "to look into matters that may be of interest to Omaha, but I am not ready to state just what they are at this time. One of the objects of my visit is to look after bookings for the coming season in Omaha. We have recently put the legitimate drama, comic opera and vaudeville. The last season has been a prosperous one with us and we are looking for a similar good business the coming season. Notwithstanding the troublesome times on the Pacific coast, business has been remarkably good. We here in Omaha found a fair business in the west, though we do not get quite the prices as in the larger cities of the east. We have to do a one, two and three-night business in the west mostly, as there are but few cities in the west that can afford more than a few nights' run.

POATERS ARE DOING NICELY

On the Alliance division corn cultivating is being pushed and the corn is in excellent condition. On the Sterling division the corn made rapid progress during the week but is still a little backward as compared with that of last year. If conditions continue favorable there will be an average yield. Potatoes are doing nicely on account of the warm weather and the general condition of the soil. Gardens on the Alliance division are in fine condition. On the Sterling division beets are doing fairly well, although some of the fields are not large enough to thin and indications for a large crop are not promising. The meadows are in excellent condition and all live stock is doing well. Wool is coming quite rapidly at some sections, with quality fair.

A. W. LANE BACK TO LINCOLN

Assistant District Attorney Gets Raise and Is Reappointed at State Capital... The attorney general has notified District Attorney A. W.
