STORM DAMAGE AT MANAWA

Electric Launch Wrecked and Dock is Torn from Moorings.

RUMORED DROWNINGS UNTRUE

Reports Arose from Fact that Several Rowboats Were Found Adrift-Water in Lake is Still High.

The wind storm Saturday night did som damage at Lake Manawa, but not as much as might have been expected. The dock at the row-boat landing was torn loose from its moorings and broken up and one of the company's electric launches was stove in by being blown against the dock. The other electric launch was saved from being damaged by one of the employes, who took the boat out into the middle of the lake so as to keep it from being dashed against the bulkheads. A number of the row boats were damaged by being torn loose from their moorings and blown against the loose portions of the landing dock.

A big cottonwood tree in the grounds of the Boat club was blown down and all over the enclosure of the lake resort limbs were broken from the trees.

For a while Saturday night, it was feared that the occupants of row boats might have been upset and drowned during the height of the storm, but as far as is known there were no fatalities. The report that several people had been drowned arose from the finding of several row boats adrift after the storm subsided, but those in charge of the boats on checking up found that these boats had been blown oose from their moorings at the time the dock was blown away.

The water is still high at the lake and

since the heavy rise of last Wednesday has remained about stationary. The docks of the rowing association are all under water, there being about three inches of water over the sail-boat dock, which is the highest. At this point the water gauge registered about eleven feet.

> Boy Strangled to Prevent Outery. The murdered boy was found near St Rose, about twenty miles from New Orleans . A sweating process wrung a confession from one of the Italian suspects, who was taken from his home in St. Rose about midnight last night and carried into the woods by a combined force of officials and vigilantes who had the search in charge. This man, Ignazio Campigciano, was kept in the woods and hour when he confessed. charging four Italians with the murder. He said that about the time of a mass meeting in New Orleans more than a week ago, neld for the purpose of prosecuting the search for the body, these men who were in a vacant house in St. Rose, became frightened and consulted about what to do with the child. The boy was crying, begging to be taken to his parents, said Campigciano, and one of the quartet of the kidnapers grabbed the child and strangled him to death to stop his noise. Later two of the kidnapers, he said, came to him carrying the body in a blanket, and after threatening him with death if he told, took

> the body into a swamp. Campigciano, after relating this story, led the police through two miles of swamp. where the searchers sometimes waded in water nearly waist deep and at others crawled under tangles of briers.
