NEW YORK, July 18.—The rapid decline in prices of stocks today was quite generally accepted as a readjustment from an artificial level established by manipulative tactics. Various occurrences were cited as weakening influences on the market, but the conviction remained that these were impelling causes toward the abandonment of a futile campaign for a rise rather than any deep-seated incentive to liquidation in the ordinary sense. Bankers and even stock commission houses are numerous which have deprecated the untimeliness of the recent operations to advance prices and to attract a public interest in stocks, but the persistence and the strength of the operations carried a certain amount of conviction with them. The campaign was carried up to the very threshold of today's severe money requirements with apparent unconcern and heedless of the warnings which have been common in the Wall street district ever since the advertisements designed to further the project began to appear.
