Next will come carriages containing the speak. members of the city council and members of the park board. Behind the carriages will come bands of music, and after the bands the German societies of Omaha. There are twenty-six

ship of more than 5,000, and it is expected

that practically the entire membership will take part in the procession.

Parade and Program. The line of march is not definitely fixed at this time, its conclusion depending much upon the condition of the weather. From the point of formation, the procession will move to Sixteenth street, thence to Doug-Ins street, thence to Thirteenth, thence to Farnam, thence to Tenth. From this point the marchers may go to the union depot and there take cars to Tenth and Bancroft streets, thence walking to the park, or they may march to Harney street, thence to Thirteenth, and take cars to the park over the Albright line.

Arriving at the park, the program will be opened by a brief address by Charles Epplen, chairman of the Schiller monument committee, who will give a history of the movement which resulted in the locasocieties, will present the monument to the city of Omaha. 
