

### GRIER GETS THREE MONTHS

Former Police Court Clerk Sentenced to Term in Jail.

### VAN GORDON LOSES HIS CASE

Judge Troup Upholds State Veterinarian Law and Says Dumb Brutes Have Rights as Well as Mankind.

Three months in the county jail and a fine of \$100 was the sentence imposed on Leo Grier by Judge Troup Saturday morning. Grier at once gave notice of appeal and will give a bond suspending the sentence until his case is heard by the supreme court. He was placed in the custody of the sheriff pending the approval of his bond by the supreme court.

Grier was convicted on seven counts of failure to turn money he had collected as clerk of the police court into the city treasury. He made no statement to the court, but his attorney, John O. Yelzer, asked for a light sentence, declaring he believed his client had turned every dollar he had collected into the treasury.

In imposing the sentence Judge Troup said that while Grier may not have appropriated any of the funds with criminal intent, the affairs of the office were conducted in such a loose manner that Grier could expect but one result, an absolute inability to account for the funds that had passed through his hands.

Grier might have received a sentence of six months and a fine of \$100.

### Veterinarian Law Good.

The constitutionality of the state veterinary law was upheld by Judge Troup in his opinion overruling the motion for a new trial in the case of A. L. Van Gordon, who was convicted of advertising himself as a veterinary surgeon without securing a license from the state board. Judge Troup said he considered the law a wise one and calculated to raise the standards of the profession. He thought the defendant should co-operate to help enforce it instead of violating it. Van Gordon was fined \$5 and cost, the minimum under the statute, which he paid.

In passing on the motion Judge Troup took the unusual position that domestic animals have an abstract right in law which men are bound to respect. He said these rights included humane treatment and skilled assistance when sick or injured. These rights, he said, are not as broad as the rights of the human family, but he cited instances to show that they existed.

Mr. Yelzer, attorney for Van Gordon, said he would not carry the case to the supreme court.

### Young Forger Sentenced.

Edward Allison, 22 years old, and Henry Bertrand, 23 years old, were two youthful forgers who pleaded guilty to an attempt to get money easy by signing some one's else name to checks. Allison was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary and Bertrand three years. Allison said he was drinking with another man, when their money gave out and the other fellow suggested he draw up a check and sign the name of his employer, Kilpatrick & Collins, to it. He did so and was arrested after realizing \$17 on the check.

Bertrand went into the forgery business by the wholesale. He opened up by stealing a few blank checks from the back of a check book belonging to the Dooley-Moody Construction company. The money he raised on these checks was used to buy the whole book. He was caught passing one of the checks on a saloon keeper at Twenty-sixth and Leavenworth. He went while Judge Troup was talking to him and referred to his mother, who is still living, but in ignorance of the trouble he is in.

### HAN PAK'S SLAYERS AT LARGE

Men Who Killed Chinese Restaurant Keeper Not Yet in Custody.

Two white men named Rogers and another named Pomroy, suspects in the Han Pak murder case, have not yet been apprehended, but as the police are fairly certain of their hiding place it is not likely that they will escape without having to face the charge. The two Rogers brothers were waiters in Pak's restaurant, and Pomroy is said to have been a bell boy at the Her Grand until recently.

What may develop into a clew of some kind is the finding by Ed Stout, keeper of the city street gang, of two bloody towels, which he discovered in an alley near Fifteenth and Douglas street, at 9 o'clock Saturday morning. They were soaked through with blood and wrapped in an Omaha newspaper. One was marked either "R. L." or "A. L." It is impossible to distinguish exactly. It has been thought from the beginning that the assailants of the Chinaman may also have been hurt, and the finding of the towels only a block and a half from the Sing Hai Low restaurant, the scene of the murder, encourages this belief.

The detective department is particularly anxious to find the culprits in the case as the murder was one of the most brutal that has been committed in Omaha for years. The coroner's inquest over the body was held Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock. Burial arrangements will not be made until Pak's relatives, who were expected Saturday night, shall arrive.

### EXPRESS CASE GOES OVER

Judge W. H. Munger Continues the Hearing Until Next Saturday.

Attorney General Thompson and Attorney Hallett E. Rose of Lincoln were in Omaha Saturday morning to appear in the matter of the application for an injunction on the part of the five express companies to restrain the Nebraska Railway commission and the attorney general from enforcing the 25 per cent reduction rate law against the express companies, which became effective July 5. The hearing was had informally before Judge W. H. Munger in chambers, with Charles J. Greene and R. W. Brockbridge appearing for the express companies. The question of jurisdiction was talked over, and by agreement of attorneys the hearing went over until Saturday, July 20. The matter thus remains as if no action had been taken, Judge Munger still declining to grant even a temporary restraining order.
