LAST OF SAMPSON'S FLEET

Famous Battleships of the Spanish-American War Placed in Reserve. The last of the battleships that participated in the Spanish war was retired from the active fleet and placed in reserve recently, their places being taken by the new battleships recently placed in commission. The vessels that are ordered in reserve are the Indiana and Iowa, both of the Fourth division of the Second squadron. The Vermont and the Kansas, vessels of 16,000 tons, will be placed in reserve in the Atlantic. The placing in reserve of the Indiana and Iowa realizes the dream of those naval officers who have long advocated as the main fighting arm in the Atlantic a powerful fleet for the backbone of which shall be four or more squadrons of battleships composed only of the most modern vessels of their type. The Texas has long since been assigned a permanent berth at Annapolis as a training ship. The Massachusetts, the Oregon and the New York are all out of commission and undergoing repairs at the various navy yards, while the Brooklyn, while still in commission, is nevertheless listed in the reserve.
