TRAIN ROBBERS BREAK JAIL

Men Who Looted Oriental Limited Saw Way to Liberty at Helena.

SEVERAL POSSES ON THE TRAIL

Followed to Mountains, Where Pursuit is Close—Great Northern Officials Express Great Surprise.

HELENA, Mont., March 21.—George Frankhauser and Charles McDonald, charged with having held up the Great Northern Oriental limited last September and rifled the registered mails of \$20,000 being transported to Helena, broke jail early this morning and are still at liberty.

The men saw their cell doors, the corridors and the bars in a window. Immediately upon discovery of their escape several posses were formed and are now in pursuit.

ST. PAUL, Minn., March 21.—McDonald and Frankhauser held up and robbed the Great Northern Overland train No. 1, two and a half miles from Randall, Mont., at 3:35 o'clock on the morning of September 13, 1907.

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DUKE SEEMS WELL SATISFIED

Cousin of King of Italy Acts Like an Engaged Man.

REPORTERS GIVEN RECORD CHASE

Complained to Have Made Motor Trip from Washington to Baltimore to See the Senator.

NEW YORK, March 21.—The duke of the Abruzzi, cousin of the king of Italy, who is reported to be engaged to marry Miss Katherine Elkins, called for Europe today on the steamer Lusitania. Up to the hour of sailing the duke declined to affirm or deny the reported engagement, but his demeanor was regarded by the reporters who gathered at the steamship pier as not that of a man who had failed in an important mission.

The duke was registered on the ship's passenger list as Wladislaw. He boarded the steamer early this morning and was accompanied to the dock by an attaché of the Italian legation at Washington and by a secret service man. To the reporters who were gathered on the dock he said: "I am very sorry that I have no interview to give out, but come and see me at 8 o'clock."

"But the ship sails at that hour," said one of the newspaper men. "Yes, I know it. I stayed up late to escape this. Everything is all right. Miss Elkins' family has refrained from making any public statement and an erroneous construction has been placed upon their silence."

It is understood that the duke will disembark at Liverpool and hasten to Rome. Auto Trip to See Father.

Washington, March 21.—As an evidence of the extreme precaution taken by the duke of the Abruzzi and his friends here to protect his movements from the curious eyes of the public, it is just learned that his royal highness did actually leave Washington in an automobile and not on a railroad train, as was reported by the station people. Attired in a short coat, a slouch hat and carrying a walking stick, he stepped into an automobile near the Italian embassy in this city and made a rapid run to Baltimore. It is believed here that he was accompanied on this trip by Miss Elkins, but the persistent refusal of the friends of the principals to furnish the smallest scrap of information to the reporters makes it very difficult to establish the fact. It is assumed, however, that the statement made in Baltimore last night was correct and that the couple did join Senator Elkins in Baltimore, whether he had gone to attend the funeral of the late Senator Whyte, and that the duke took a train from Baltimore and continued on his way to New York, whence he sailed this morning for Europe. It was stated at the morning house today that the senator had not yet returned to Washington.

MAN ASKS FOR ROOM TO DIE

Stranger Enters Doctor's Office and Requests Space Enough to Kill Himself.

A disheveled, wild-eyed man walked into the office of Dr. D. D. Raber in the Brandegee block yesterday.

"Can you spare me space to commit suicide here, partner?" he asked, pulling a razor.

The physician did not think he could spare the space and beside, it would mess up the office so badly. So he attempted to get possession of the razor. The man dropped the razor and then tried to get possession of some bottles of acid, not being particular as to the manner of killing himself. Finally he was quieted and told a rambling story which was evidently the product of a disordered brain.

The man proved to be Fred Hines, a Bohemian farmer, who disappeared from his home in Morse Bluff, near Fremont, the night of March 11. His team was found hitched to a tree near the Platte river two miles from North Bend and it was assumed that he had committed suicide.

Dr. Raber communicated with Hines' friends in Morse Bluffs and they came down yesterday and took Hines back with them.

Hines' mind is a blank from the night of his mysterious disappearance. His friends say he has been worrying over an imaginary grievance.

Husband Murders Wife.

BOHNETO, Ill., March 21.—L. Evans shot and killed his wife near the Clover Leaf railroad station last night and then shot himself, but inflicted only slight wounds. He was immediately arrested and placed in jail. A heavy guard was placed at the jail owing to covert threats of lynching that were made. Evans and his wife were separated four months ago and he left town, returning unexpectedly yesterday. His wife was in the railroad station when he called her outside and shot her three times, killing her instantly.

OFFICER'S CHANCE FOR ALLEY

Given Second Subpoena Against W. K. Vanderbilt on Charge of Speeding His Car.

NEW YORK, March 21.—As a result of Commissioner Bingham's letter to the district attorney in behalf of Blyden Follen-Martin, in which the commissioner said he did not feel that Martin had been treated fairly by Magistrate Keogh, who on March 19 discharged W. K. Vanderbilt, Jr., whom Martin had arrested for speeding, a subpoena summoning Mr. Vanderbilt to appear Monday before the court of special sessions was given yesterday to Martin, who will serve it himself.

DIAMOND SPECIAL WRECKED

Illinois Central Limited Strains Tapes Over, Spikes Being Removed from Rails.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., March 21.—The "Diamond Special," the fast train on the Illinois Central between Chicago and St. Louis, was derailed early today two miles south of this city. The locomotive and baggage and express car turned over and the buffet car left the rails. No one was injured. The wreck was caused by train workers. All the spikes in one rail had been pulled out.

CONCESSIONS ARE CANCELLED

Valuable Rights of Americans in Venezuela Abrogated by High Court.

CARACAS, Venezuela, March 21.—The high federal court of Venezuela yesterday handed down a decision from which there is no appeal, against the Maracaibo company and the Orinoco company, limited, American concerns, annulling the famous Fitzgerald concession under which these companies claimed rights in Venezuela. The claims of these companies constitute one of the matters which are now being discussed diplomatically between Washington and President Castro. Rudolph Dolge, representing the Orinoco company, the present owners of the Fitzgerald concession, has filed a protest with the American legation here
