Congressman Hinshaw Introduces Bill at Request of American Medical Association Which Arouses Public Interest.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—(Special.)—Through the efforts of Congressman Hinshaw, Senator Knox and Senator Dick, the two army surgeons who virtually gave their lives in establishing the mosquito theory of the spread of yellow fever are to be placed on the rolls of American heroes.

Major Walter Reed, under whose direction the yellow fever experiments were instituted in Cuba shortly after the close of the Spanish war, died in 1902, and the medical interests of the country raised a fund of \$25,000 as a testimonial to his services.

ADDRESS OF LABOR LEADERS

Organizations Urged to Aid in Passing Certain Legislation.

PRESSURE TO BEAR ON CONGRESS

Union Men Asked to Question Candidates Regarding Their Position on Labor Issues.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—"While the supreme court or other institutions may be able to temporarily retard and seriously embarrass the growth and action of our movement, we would assert that no power on earth can destroy, successfully outlaw or disrupt the trade union movement."

Pressure on Legislators. The further statement is made that the conference was the unanimous feeling of the conference that some steps should be taken to impress upon congress the necessity for prompt action toward amending the Sherman anti-trust law so that it shall be inapplicable to "organizations or associations not for profit and without capital stock, not to members of such organizations or associations, nor to any arrangements, agreements or combinations among persons engaged in agriculture or horticulture made with a view of enhancing the price of their own agricultural or horticultural products."

After stating it to be the duty of laboring men to question candidates for congress as to their attitude toward labor legislation the address called upon the labor workers "to stand faithfully together to oppose and defeat our enemies, whether they be candidates for president, for congress or other offices whether legislative, executive or judicial."

Continuing the address says: "We call upon all labor to use every possible legitimate effort to secure for the workers their inalienable liberties and their proper recognition as a vital portion of the fabric of our civilization."

Home-seekers on the Move. Comparative Cheap Lands of the South and West Attract Home-seekers.

The two months of leisure activities in the cities and manufacturing districts of the country are producing the natural result of increasing the home-seekers among the comparatively cheap land of the south and west. The departure of a surplus population of the cities adds materially the persons who remain therein, while that surplus in its new spheres of action is apt to achieve greater results than if it had been employed in a normal way at the old home.
