DIVERTING RUNNING STREAMS

A Claim of Our Government Which Might Have Far-Reaching Effect.

A scientist commissioned by the Canadian government to investigate the problems connected with the utilization of streams whose natural flow is toward the sea.

One scientist recently stated that a proposed diversion in Canada of 40,000 cubic feet of water a second would not only impair certain scenic effects in the falls and rapids, but lower Lake Erie three feet, which would in turn lower the Detroit river, lakes Huron and Michigan and compel a corresponding lowering of all the canals depending upon any of those lakes for water.
