NEW ORLEANS, April 31 .- The precautions taken to safeguard the United States from yellow fever infection from Cuba were described in an interview today by Dr. John N. Thomas, assistant surgeon of the Marine hospital service, who arrived here vesterday from Hayana. He said that the names and destinations of all passengers for the United States are taken and forwarded with the vessel on which they sail to the port physicians of southern have been done by putting wood pulp and ports in the United States and these officers keep such passengers under surveillance for six days after arrival, so that if sickness occurs it is quickly detected, and if it is of an infectious nature the proper measures can be taken to prevent its spread.

LITTLE CHANCE FOR LEGISLATION

Measures Pending Refore Congress Likely to Be Side-Tracked.

WASHINGTON, April 22-At a meeting of the republican steering committee of the senate today the legislative program was discussed, but no decision was reached to add any important measures to those destined for enactment at the present ses alon of congress. In regard to the currency legislation it was stated that if the house passed a bill providing for a commission to investigate financial matters the senate would immediately upon receipt of th measure vote to adopt the Aldrich currency bill with a view of putting the whole subject into conference.

Senator Aldrich made it clear that if here was to be financial legislation of any character at this session it would be along the line of what already had been done in the senate, with concurrence in the proviaion for a commission to ait during the recess of congress to consider currency

matters. Senator Hale told his colleagues on the committee that the sentiment of the senate was against the four battleships schem advocated by the president and that it would be useless to try to get an appropria tion for more than two battleships at this session.

It appeared from the discussion that there were few measures in addition to the appropriation bills that have any prospect for passage at the present session.
