In the Field of Electricity

Growing Plants by Electricity.
NEW system introduced by H. B. Thwait, electrical engineer, which undertakes to supply all the necessities of the living plant, is described in The World Today for April. From a single apparatus, with an electrical apparatus, it is possible to obtain artificial light, carbonic acid gas, heat and energizing current to stimulate the growth of both the upper and lower portions of the plant.
It is a simple point, but in these experiments it has been found to be a very important one, to have the electric arc continuously on the move. This is arranged by affixing the lamp to a small motor which runs up and down the house on rails. A moment's thought will show the purpose of this device. Owing to the apparent movements of the sun, the rays from the motor orb are never stationary for a single minute on any part of vegetation. Another special feature is the placing of a water screen so that the electric rays passing through this medium are robbed of most of their heat. Very much the same process goes on in the case of the sun and our world. The rays of light as they reach us have been toned down from much of their fierceness because they have passed through that which is practically a water screen, composed of countless myriads of molecules particles which go to make up our atmosphere.

Electrical Engineers.
That the electrical engineer would teach the world how to live, that he is today solving the greatest problems of the human race and that in the future electrical engineering would be foremost in making better the lot of man, were a few of the important points made by Prof. Charles F. Steinmetz before the Electrical Engineering Society of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. According to the Boston Transcript's report, Prof. Steinmetz said that nearly all the great advances in engineering in recent years had been through electrical engineers. The development of the great hydraulic turbine was by an electrical engineer, the great steam turbines were developed by the electrical engineers, Parsons in England and Curtis in America, and the same was true in other lines of work. He attributed this pre-eminence of electrical engineers in the advance of the age to the great accuracy of work necessary and possible in electrical engineering. It seems a far cry from electrical engineering to sociological problems, but Prof. Steinmetz claimed for the electrical engineer, his plain, ordinary trolley car and his great electric locomotive, the solution of that great problem, the depopulation of the country and the massing of large numbers of people in the city. Already, said Prof. Steinmetz, has the tide set back toward the soil, the people living within ten and twenty miles radius of the cities instead of as a few years ago within a two-mile radius. This was of great advantage to the big cities, for in the former case it was possible to have 15,000 workers in a factory, as at Schenectady those workers spread over a radius of seventeen miles, with the city not a city, but the country. To the electrical engineer the world now turned, said Prof. Steinmetz, for the solution of the problem of man's nature. The human race in its career had laid barren the lands it had passed over and had now run to the limit. The seeking for new lands had stopped and the people could no longer draw on the capital of nature. It was then the business of the electrical engineer to harness all the great water power going to waste, not on the big streams, but on the small streams, and to use this power instead of the fast diminishing coal and wood supply. Also the electrical engineer will have to solve the problem of reviving the soil, the making of the nitrates to put back into the soil as they are taken out. This may lead the engineers into electro-chemistry, but the engineer of today must be ready for this turn. He then gave a talk on the work he has now taken up of finding the constants for an equation which will cover everything that may happen in an electrical circuit, the working out of which will revolutionize many parts of modern electrical practice.
Telephone Rates.
An ordinance intended to give legal effect to a settlement of disputes between the Bell Telephone company and the authorities of Kansas City has been introduced in the city council. It proposes an immediate reduction of telephone rates from 85c to 60c in the business district and from 60c to 40c for instruments in residences.
Accompanying this ordinance was another effecting a compromise between the city and the Missouri and Kansas Telephone company popularly known as the Bell system, whereby the city drops its pole and conduit scheme of taxation and is to accept 2 per cent of the gross earnings of the company, in addition to the right to use one conduit and all pins on Bell

The experiments have shown that the increase in efficiency of the metallized over that of the carbon filament is due to higher filament temperature and to selective radiation, while for the tantalum filament it is due almost wholly to higher temperatures. Stacker has gray hairs due to the fright he received.
