Big Army in New York in Centennial Procession. NOTABLE MEN IN LINE OF MARCH End of Week's Program to Celebrate One Hundredth Year of Establishment of Faith in the East.

NEW YORK, May 2.—Sixty thousand Roman Catholic laymen, marching in procession today, brought to a climax and formally ended the week-long celebration of the centennial of the founding of the Roman Catholic diocese of New York.

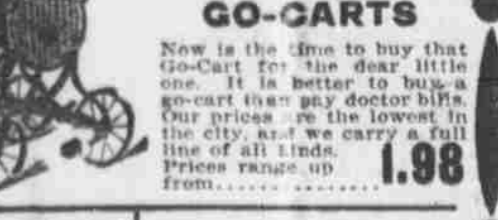
