WATERLOO, Ia., May 15.—(Special Telegram.)—Two children, aged 9 and 7 years, were cremated last night in the burning of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Potter, living near Greene. The parents left home to transact business in town. The children poured kerosene on the fire and an explosion followed. The bodies were burned to a crisp and the house and contents destroyed.

THIRTY LIVES LOST IN SOUTH. Three Towns Are Destroyed by Tornado in Northern Louisiana. SHREVEPORT, La., May 15.—Thirty dead and 30 injured in a conservative estimate of the fatalities caused by the tornado which swept through northwest Louisiana yesterday, destroying three small towns and leaving wrecked homes and ruined crops in a path a mile wide and fifty miles long. The dead at Gilliam, which had about 30 inhabitants, number thirteen, while at Bollinger the death list is six. The towns are about fifteen miles apart and nothing has been learned of the work of the storm in the country between. At Ellmore several houses were destroyed and it is not known how many people perished. Several of the dead were brought to Shreveport on the relief train from Gilliam this morning, and hospitals and sanitariums are crowded with injured, several of whom will die. Only two houses were left standing at Gilliam. The dead at Gilliam are: MRS. HENRY GODFREY, MRS. JOHN GARDNER, A. HAYGOOD, JOY SIMMONS, NINE NEGROES, A. LAMBKIN, a farmer living in the country near Gilliam, was killed, together with his wife and four children. At Bollinger the dead are: MRS. RAY, MRS. MARSHALL DAVIS, FOUR NEGROES. Eleven white persons and nineteen negroes more or less seriously injured have been brought to the charity hospital here. The injured at Bollinger number about forty persons, some of whom have been brought here. Of these it is believed that not more than three or four will die.

LAND GRABBERS INDICTED. Grand Jury in Denver Returns Sixty Bills Charging Illegal Fencing and Perjury. DENVER, May 15.—The federal grand jury reported sixty indictments today in the case of twenty-six for unlawful fencing of public lands, thirteen for perjury in obtaining lands and one for timber trespass. Among those indicted are: Franklin M. Barnes, lumberman, Denver; A. R. Gumm, ranchman and politician, Florence; E. E. Miller, Wray; Thomas Ashton, capitalist, Wray; Shephard Husted, forest manager and hotel man, Estes park; Warren Rutledge, forest ranger, Estes park; Yampa Livestock company, Routt county. A woman was indicted on the charge of unlawfully enclosing 2,000 acres of government land in Wyoming.

CALIFORNIA DELEGATES FOR TAFT. State Convention and Six Districts Instruct for the Secretary. SACRAMENTO, Cal., May 15.—The republican state convention tonight instructed delegates-at-large for Taft. The convention elected George A. Knight, Henry Melvin, M. H. DeYoung and Jacob N. Neff delegates-at-large. General Otis was defeated by a vote. The republican state convention met this afternoon and affected a temporary organization by a vote of 251 to 256. George A. Knight, the candidate of the organization forces, was elected temporary chairman over W. B. Davis, the nominee of the Lincoln-Roosevelt league. The usual committee was appointed and a recess until 8 p. m. was taken. In the interim congressional district conventions convened and elected delegates-at-large as follows: First District—Delegates, J. P. Wenz and B. Thompson; alternates, Harold T. Powers and Senator Abner Reed. Second District—Delegates, Captain E. L.

EVIDENCE IN BATTIEY CASE

Defendant Goes on Stand and is Now Up to the Argument.

DISPUTED BOOKS IN EVIDENCE

County Attorney Shows They Were Purchased by the County and Judge Then Rules They Are Admissible.

With the examination of the defendant the taking of evidence in the trial of the action to remove H. V. Battiey from the office of clerk of the district court of Pottawattamie county was completed yesterday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock. Counsel will begin their arguments this morning and the case is expected to go to the jury some time today.

Mr. Battiey on direct examination stated that he considered he was entitled to the complete record fees except in such cases where the complete record was required by law or upon order of court. The petition for removal charges Mr. Battiey with failing to turn over to the county in a number of cases the fees received by his office for complete records. As to the alterations and erasures in the records of his office Mr. Battiey absolutely denied. But he was declared that he had not made any of the erasures or alterations, which in practically every case have connection with the amount of the fee for the complete record which it is alleged he failed to account for when making his turnover to the county.

In answer to a question from his counsel Mr. Battiey stated he was ready and had been at all times to make good any errors or omissions that might be found in the accounts of his office. He attributed many of the alleged errors to the old system of keeping the accounts in probate cases, which system he said he had since discarded.

The direct examination of Mr. Battiey was also calculated to show that in the vast volume of business handled in his office errors and mistakes were liable to occur.

Among the witnesses for the state yesterday was James W. Mitchell, county treasurer. Mr. Mitchell was appointed in the suit of Eberhard against Eberhard, and he testified that in the settlement of the case he had paid Mr. Battiey \$26 for court costs. Mr. Mitchell held a receipt for the \$26. On behalf of the state it was contended that the records of the office and the report made by Mr. Battiey to the county showed that only \$14 had been turned over to the county.

On making an additional showing of their need for the proper trial of the case, Judge Hess sustained yesterday morning Judge MacCarty's application for an order for the production of the ledger and cash book kept by Mr. Battiey in connection with the business of his office. At the opening of the trial this application was denied, the defense contending that such books were the private property of Mr. Battiey.

In renewing his application for the production of the books which the defense claimed to be private property, County Attorney Hess offered evidence to show that the county had paid for the books asked for and that the records of the office were kept by Mr. Battiey without the ledger kept by Mr. Battiey.

Roy Hardesty, deputy in Mr. Battiey's office, was recalled and asked if he made the alterations and erasures in the records. He said he did not.

Thomas Egan, who assisted C. J. Richman in checking up the clerk's office, and John M. Matthews, who on prior occasions had checked over the office, were also placed on the stand yesterday morning.
