

SHIP SUBSIDY DEAD

House Rejects Conference Report on Postoffice Bill

FIGHT MADE ON THIRD SECTION

Little Probability That House Conference Will Yield to Senate.

PUBLICITY BILL IS PASSED

Amendment Provides for Reduction of Southern Representation.

DEMOCRATS STRONGLY OBJECT

Mr. Dabell Shows That Entire Vote for Congressman in Mississippi Is Less Than One District in the North.

WASHINGTON, May 22.—Practically all hope of a ship subsidy was abandoned today when the house, by a vote of 16 to 26 rejected the conference report on the postoffice appropriation bill containing a provision for the reduction of southern representation in the house of the southern states, was passed. The democrats voted against the bill because of the amendment.

By way of further clearing up pending business, the southern pension bill conference report was received; the conference report on the District of Columbia bill was agreed to and the senate amendments to the general deficiency and military academy appropriation and omnibus Indian land bill were all disagreed to and sent back to conference.

The democrats exercised their parliamentary prerogative and in all cases forced roll calls in the disposition of the business in hand.

Mr. Crumpacker explained his amendment by saying that he was designed against fraud and intimidation in election. "They surrounded the ballots in the selection of members of the house," he said, "with sufficient safeguards to warrant their purity."
