The deed to the property was taken out in the name of the Security Building company, which it is alleged was organized for the purpose. Mr. Wickham alleges that the late Mr. Hannan took possession of the building, collected the rents, amounting to about \$20,000 and refused to make any accounting with him. As the company, Mr. Wickham alleges, never held any meetings and kept no records, he does not know the exact amount collected for rents or the amount expended for taxes and keeping the building in repair.

CAMPAIGN CLOSES MONDAY

Primary to Be Held Tuesday Ends One of Most Intense Contests in Iowa.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, Ia., May 29.—(Special.)—The political campaign in Iowa, now under way, will not close till the night before the primary. The primary election will be held next Tuesday. Senator Dolliver will speak Monday night for Senator Allison at Fort Dodge. Governor Cummins will speak for himself in Fort Dodge, which is Dolliver's home town. The campaign for the majority of the speakers closed tonight, for tomorrow is Memorial day, but Attorney General Byers and a number have dates to fill for Monday. At the still, house things will be dead till next Wednesday. Tomorrow most of the offices will be closed all day on account of it being Memorial day, and most of the clerks who live out of Des Moines look advantage of the opportunity and left for their homes tonight. They will remain away till after Tuesday's primary. Frank D. Winn has started suit in the district court here for \$5,000 damages against the American Express company. This is the price of a prize hog that was shown at the Iowa State fair last year. The hog was the property of J. J. Ward and B. Smith of Belleville, Kan. It was turned over to the express company to ship to Lincoln, Neb., to the state fair at that place, and it is charged, the express company paid so many hogs in and around it that this hog was overcome by the heat, and died. The dead hog was known as "Statesman," and was an especially fine animal. It is estimated by commission concerns here that Iowa speculators have made \$500,000 on corn during the Patten corner. Fully half of that amount was cleared by local people. Danger of a further raise in the Des Moines river is past for the present. The rain of night before last failed to raise the river much and today the water began to go down. Investigation has disclosed that there were lots of thirty-forty families forced to leave their homes in the bottom lands of the city. If there are no further heavy rains it is believed they will soon be able to return to their homes. The Good Government club of Des Moines today advertised to pay a reward of \$500 for the conviction of any violators of the election laws or primary law next Tuesday. Candidates have subscribed sums that make the total reward \$500. VETERINARIANS ON HOG CHOLERA. Belief Cure Has Been Discovered for This Disease. AMES, May 29.—(Special.)—For years the veterinarians of the United States Department of Agriculture and the different state experiment stations have been trying to find a reliable cure for hog cholera. Their efforts have been successful and in order to celebrate the event and to arrange the many details in connection with the preparation of the remedy on a commercial scale and get it before the farmers of the state, the Bureau of Agriculture and Chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry Dr. A. D. Melvin have called together at Ames today a ten day congress of the veterinarians of the corn belt states to talk the matter over with the officials of the bureau of animal industry. At this meeting a statement in the process of administering the new remedy will be given to the different state veterinarians and meat inspectors. The process will be scattered throughout the afflicted states. During the last fiscal year, of the 19,635 hogs slaughtered in the great packing centers under government inspection, over 15,225 were cholera suspects. This number takes no account of the great amount of damage done to individual herds throughout the country every season. The process consists of the injection of the blood of an affected animal into the circulation of a healthy animal under the influence of the disease. This must be combined with the injection of the serum of an animal already immune. The production of a vaccine by means of infected blood instead of artificial cultures of the germ is the basis of the cure. These deductions were the result of observations of the action of the disease upon hogs that had once been through an attack. The method has been so successful that it is generally conceded by prominent veterinarians that it will completely rob the hog cholera scourge of its terrors. For over six months the veterinarians of Iowa, Missouri, Minnesota and Nebraska have been working in cooperation with the federal authorities to determine to what extent the process would reduce the value in practical use. It now rests with the state and government authorities to see that this process is efficiently carried out. At the present meeting it will also be decided whether this cholera cure will be distributed by state or federal authorities or by private individuals. Dolliver at Marshalltown.
