

Detroit Ties for First Place in American; Undeclared Colin Wins Belmont Stakes; Cornell Wins

CORNELL WINS CHAMPIONSHIP

Ithaca Athletes Finish First in Premier College Event of Year.

PENNSYLVANIA IS SECOND

Good Time Made Despite Muddy Field and Heavy Rain that Continued Practically All Day.

PHILADELPHIA, May 30.—Under weather conditions about as bad as could be imagined for a track meet the stout-hearted athletes of Cornell university today on Franklin field won the Intercollegiate championship, the premier college athletic event of the year, by a margin of 64 points. The total points scored by the Ithacans was 54. Pennsylvania was second with 24; Yale third with 17; Harvard fourth, 17; and Dartmouth fifth, 17. Michigan and Swarthmore each made 4 points, Princeton and Columbia 4 each and Syracuse, 1. No records were broken, but good time was made considering the conditions. A heavy rain which set in early in the day was coming down in torrents when the meet began. The track was flooded in many places and the field was ankle deep with water.

Cornell's all-around work was excellent. Its men scoring in seven events. The Ithacans took four firsts, three seconds, two thirds and one fourth. Pennsylvania also scored in seven events winning four firsts, two seconds, one third, one fourth and dividing one fifth. Cornell practically won on its showing in the two-mile race. A noteworthy feature of the day was the performance of the Yale pole vaulters. All of the Yale men who qualified yesterday tied for first place at 11 feet and consequently the New Haven team captured the entire eleven points in the event.

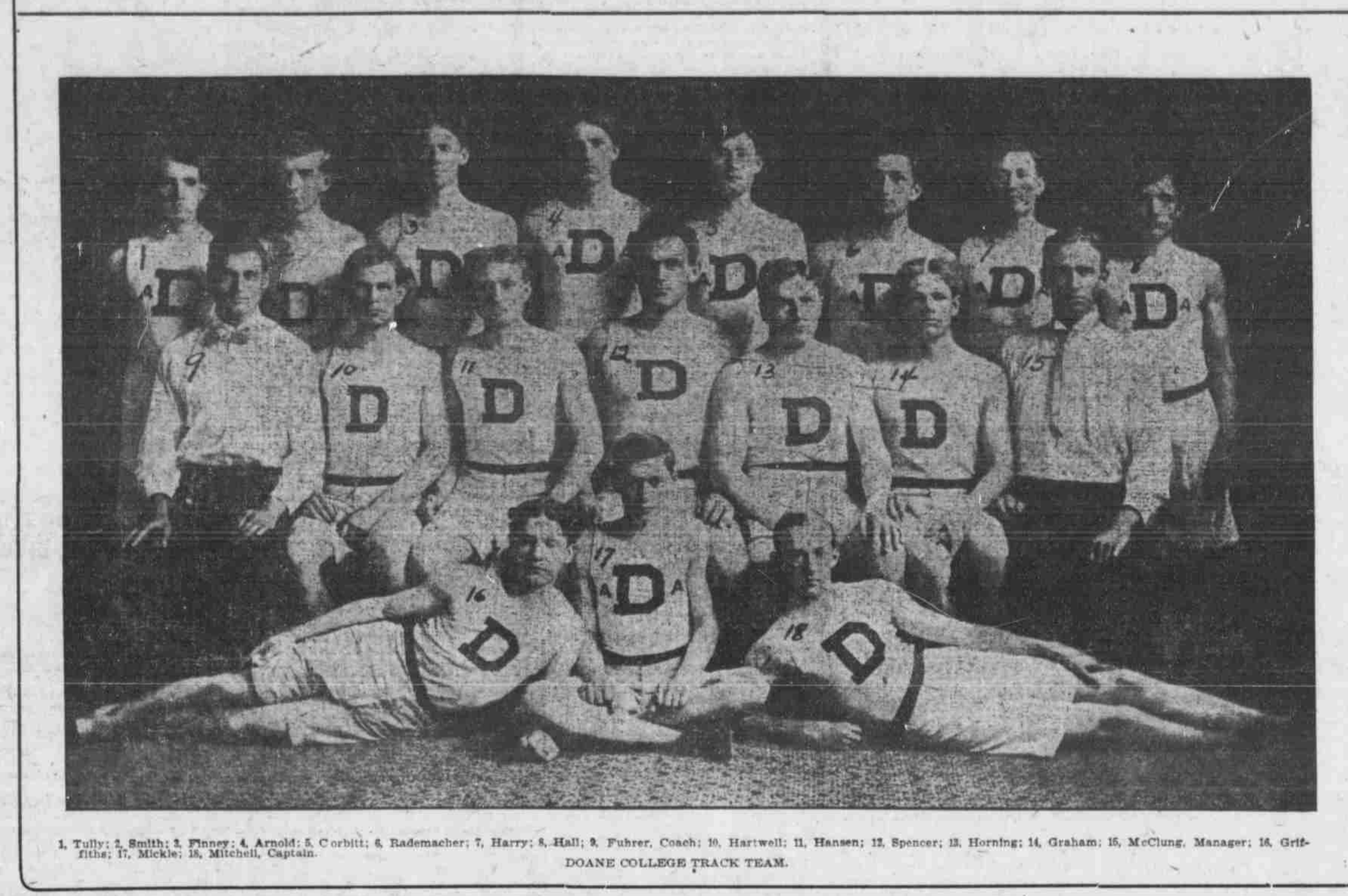

COLIN WINS BELMONT STAKE

Great Son of Commando Pulls Down Another Big Sum.

INJURY PROVES TO BE SLIGHT

Statement that He Would Never Race Again Was Premature—Favorite Is Given Ovation by Big Crowd.

NEW YORK, May 30.—Greeted by the enthusiastic cheers of tens of thousands of racers, who idolize him, Colin, the great son of Commando, won the valuable Belmont stake at Belmont Park today. Not in many years, if ever, has there been such a demonstration of enthusiastic affection for a thoroughbred as that accorded Colin as he passed the finish line for his fourteenth consecutive victory with never a defeat against him. It was only a short head in front of August Belmont's Fair Play, but he stood a hard drive in the last furlongs of the race without flinching. He was pulled up apparently strong and sound and as he came back to the judges' stand the crowd of more than 30,000 persons rose to their feet and cheered while the band played "Hail to the Chief."

The race was worth \$30,000 to the winner and brings the horse's returns to his owner, James R. Keene, up to more than \$100,000.

When it was announced on Thursday that Colin had suffered serious injury in a sensational workout in which he had covered a mile and a quarter in 2:06, that he might never race again, public sorrow and sympathy for his owner was widespread. Although the horse is so much in a class by himself that the odds quoted against him in every race are practically prohibitive, still removing him from the field of speculation, the public generally has come to look forward to his races with the keenest interest.

Coming back of Colin today was almost as unexpected as and sensational as the announcement of last Thursday that he would almost certainly not race again. It was almost midnight when the news came that Colin was hit when exercising. The injury was only temporary. Today James R. Keene, his owner, went to the Belmont track and had a consultation with his trainer, James Rowe, as to the advisability of sending the horse to the post for the Belmont stakes.

It was raining in torrents and the track was very muddy and slippery conditions in which Mr. Keene usually withdraws his best stake horses. Up to the time the first race was started no decision had been announced and the great gathering at the Belmont course waited with eager interest for news from the Keene stables. Just at the last minute word came that Colin would be an added starter, and when the handsome, brown horse came trotting up to the judges' stand there was a deafening cheer which lasted until he had passed out of sight through the blinding rain for the starting barrier.

The race was so thick that it was impossible to see the start of the race, and it was not until the mud-splashed racers had swung into the home stretch that the crowd was able to pick out the Keene colts in front. From that point until the finish there was a scene of wild enthusiasm which was hushed for just a moment when Fair Play with a rush challenged the winner. Neither who rode Colin apparently mistook what was the finish line for the present point where the race and began to ease his mount a little. Not that he could be taken by today's race Colin showed that he is thoroughly game, that he can be a good distance, the Belmont stakes being a mile and three-eighths and that he is peerless even under unfavorable conditions. He trotted out to the paddock after the race without a lame step.
