BIG COLLEGES FAVOR FOOT BALL

Some Results of Last Season—Prospects of Varsity Track Teams Judged by Performances of This Year's Freshmen.

The athletic season in the college is drawing to an end and with a few more base ball games and the intercollegiate football races will have been put aside for the year.

The last academic year has been exciting more by reason of discussion by athletes than by reason of performance by athletes.

Starting in the fall, the reformed football was the object of much attention. The game in its second year of regeneration was watched with great interest by faculty members, who had conceded that it was a better game than that of three seasons ago.

In the eastern section of the country relations between universities were fairly harmonious in the football season. In the west, however, there were bitter sentiments.

The football season may be considered to have been fairly successful, taken all in all. The game was a more pleasing and less dangerous spectacle.

The leaders of the abolition movement are not finding many converts on the Atlantic coast, Columbia and Swarthmore; on the Pacific coast, Leland Stanford and California.

After football came a winter sport, basketball. This game succeeded in making for itself a large and wholesome crop of enemies.

The net result of the intercollegiate season seems to be that the winter sports are to be limited. As a matter of fact they take up too much time.

The season, as far as intercollegiate relations are concerned, has not been entirely satisfactory. Michigan has broken with the conference, which has been forced to take in smaller colleges instead.

Yale defeated Swarthmore. Cornell and Princeton disagreed over football and later because of a base ball game, although this latter difficulty has since been cleared up.

Yesterday afternoon, the Eagles winning by a score of 5 to 0, in a nine-inning game. There was a large crowd present and the game was one of the warmest that has been played here in some time.
