### BREAD CRUMB PANCAKES

Soak one cup of stale, crumbled bread in one cup of sweet milk for half an hour, add one egg beaten very light, one teaspoon each of salt and sugar and four level teaspoons of baking powder and one-half cup of flour sifted together. Add one teaspoon of melted fat and bake on hot criddle. If sour milk is at hand, use one-half teaspoon of soda and two of baking powder.

### NEVER FAIL DUMPLING

Damplings (which never fail)-Two cups flour, one-half large tablespoon lard, one teaspoon baking powder, one teaspoon salt, milk to moisten. Sift who was educated in England.
