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

#### WHITE LABOR BATTALIONS SENT OVERSEAS

Washington, D. C., Oct. 4 .- The war college at Washington advise; that there have been registered 207 white labor companies, 200 of which were sent overseas before their organization was entirely completed. This is positive evidence that these labor battalions are not confined exclusiveyl to Colored membership, as has been intimated in some quarters.

### INSTRUCTION IN DRESSMAKING

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
