Antimony in the Transvaal. A new body of antimony is reported

to have have been opened near the Komati river, in the district of the Stenysdorp gold fields, Transvaal. As the ore is found to be valuable, a mining company is now carrying on smelting operations on the spot. Three shafts have been sunk to a depth of 50 feet, besides open workings. One is continuous throughout.
