### WILL CELEBRATE SILVER ANNIVERSARY

Congregation of Grove Methodist

Sunday, March 2, will mark the  
twenty-fifth anniversary of the ordi-  
nation of the Rev. Griffin G. Logan,  
D. D., pastor of Grove Methodist Epis-  
copal church. The congregation which  
he has served so faithfully for the  
past five years, assisted by Dr. Log-  
an's many friends outside of the  
church, are planning to fittingly ob-  
serve the anniversary by a series of  
appropriate services beginning Sun-  
day, March 2, and continuing through-  
out the week. A financial effort will  
be made at that time to raise an ade-

made good. He laid foundations that
