The state department refused to grant passports to any of the delegates chosen, stating that France was opposed to the holding of a Pan-Afrin congress. This statement was subequently proven to be absolutely erroneous. France willingly gave her consent despite opposition not from France, but from the United States and in spite of this opposition. The congress was held in January, but only a few colored Americans were able to be present because of the denial of passports. The state department, however, readily granted passports to Irish-American delegates who desired to present Ireland's claims before the peace conference. This was clearly an interference in England's domestic policy. This action is here cited to show how inconsistent the state department was in refusing assports to Colored Americans, while granting them to Irish Americans.

William Monroe Trotter did not get to attend the Pan-African congress, but he did get a chance to do effective lobbying among delegates to the peace conference, and put them in possession of facts touching the treatment of the race in the United States by the loud-voiced propagandists of democracy for the world.
