VEW YORK, April 8.— The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, 70 Fifth avenue, New York, has made public the following statement regarding the signing by the governor of Kentucky of a bill to punish mob violence:

In view of the lynching on March 29 of Grant Smith, a colored man, at Millersburg, Ky., by a mob which overpowered the sheriff and the police chief as they were taking their prisoner to jail, it is interesting to note that only one week prior to this occurrence Governor Edwin P. Morrow of Kentucky signed a bill providing for the punishment of lynchers and for the removal of the peace officer who surrenders his prisoner.
